# KLAMATH BOY IN SIGNAL CORPS

BERNARD W. ZOLLMAN WRITES OF GOOD MEALS AND HIS WORK IN THE "DISPATCHERS" DEPARTMENT

The following letter has been received by the Herald from Bernard W. Zollman, a member of Depot Co. 1, Signal Corps, who is stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., with a number of other Klamath Falls boys.

FT. LEAVENWORTH, Kans., June 14.—We are very thankful for your paper. It makes us think someone remembers us while we are gone.

We are feeling fine, and get plenty to eat and sleep, with lots of study and one hour of drill.

Our eats are the best to be had in most 50-cent boarding houses. Some days it is chicken and the rest that go with a chicken dinner, and some days we get ice cream for desert.

Our sleep is from 9 o'clock p. m. to 6 a. m., but sometimes we don't get to bed until 11.

We study Morse telegraphy, wireless, wig-wag or a single flag, semaphore, in which we use two flags, and the heliograph, which is used by the reflection of the sun.

Our drills are without guns. We don't kill people, but we have our little part to do. We send orders from the man higher up.

Our postoffice address is Depot Co. 1, Signal Corps.

We are glad to hear from any of the people of Klamath Falls.
