LARGE STEAMER MAY BE SAVED

THE OLYMPIA WENT ON ROCKS OFF BLIGH ISLAND IN 1910 AND WITHSTANDS THE EFFECT OF THE WEATHER

VALDEX, Alaska, June 22.—An attempt may be made to lift the wrecked steamer Olympia, which has been impaled on a pinnacle rock off Bligh Island since December 30, 1910, and put her in commission again. This staunch hulk has withstood the battering of the seas in Prince William sound without a tremor, and although dismantled of all movable parts, stands erect as the night she struck. She is the marvel of all Alaska tourists, appearing to be afloat instead of ashore.

The eyes of shipping men have been cast toward the wrecked Olympia since the value of carriers of all classes and description has increased to unprecedented figures, owing to the war, and men now are working on plans for floating the vessel. They explain that salvage plans would entail considerable expense, but with the high price of tonnage, the undertaking might not be a large profit, just for the plates composing the steel hull.

The Olympia ran on Bligh Island reef during a terrific storm, while on her way from Cordova to Valdez. By chance more cargo remained in her forward hold than aft, and she was down by the head so far as to fall to answer to her helm. Captain James Daniels, the master, saved the lives of all on board by ordering them not to take to the boats during the night. He lost his life last summer when the steamship Admiral Clark of the Pacific Steamship company foundered in the Gulf of Mexico.

TIMBER CRUISERS COMPLETING TASK

LANDS OF OLD CALIFORNIA-OREGON LAND GRANT ARE NEARING FINISH OF CLASSIFICATION—EXPECTED TO BE OPENED SOON

ROSEBURG, June 22.—Crews of government timber cruisers are completing their big task of classifying thousands of acres of former California railroad grant lands in Southern Oregon, which probably will be thrown open for entry next September. The cruisers began work here August 1, 1916.

Officials of the Roseburg land office have received inquiries about the lands from prospective settlers in many parts of the United States and Canada. Most of the letters inquire about the agricultural possibilities of the land and the provisions of the homestead laws, under which the tracts will be thrown open.

At present definite figures on the exact size of the tracts to be opened are not to be had. Douglas county contains 672,200 acres of the grant lands, Josephine county 120,000, Jackson county 464,070, and Klamath county 12,400.
