

MY CONTRACT RESULTS IN SUIT

SEEHORN COMPANY SUES PELTON LOOSELY ON ALLEGED HAY CONTRACT — PLAINTIFF ASKS \$2,332.01

A suit has been brought by Seehorn & Co. against Carey V. Looney and J. C. Pelton on a hay contract, which the plaintiff alleges the defendant did not fulfill and asks the sum of \$2,332.01, plus \$2,992.05, alleged loss, and

the sum of \$239.96, alleged paid defendants by plaintiff and still retained by them.

Under the terms of the contract the defendants were to furnish the plaintiff with 400 tons of hay at \$11 per ton, said contract being made last year, and to be delivered by June 1, 1917, says the complaint.

Plaintiff alleges that he made further contracts on such hay, and except for 200.53 tons delivered by defendant, was compelled to buy other hay at \$26 per ton to fill orders at \$30 per ton, 199.47 tons of hay having been bought at this price to fill orders, resulting in a loss of \$2,992.05 to plaintiff, it is alleged.

Plaintiff alleges he paid defendant the sum of \$2,447.79, a sum of \$239.96 over the cost of the hay received, and that this money has not been returned.

SUIT BROUGHT FOR COLLECTION OF NOTE

The lawsuit brought by O. A. Stearns against H. F. Murdock and Christine Murdock to collect a \$300 note resulted in a jury trial this week to collect the note.

The defendant set up counter claim that the ranch was not turned over to him for ten days after date contract called for, defendant setting up loss of hay, milk, and others.

The sum of \$56 was allowed defendant on the hay; \$40 on milk, injury to cows claimed, none; damage to alfalfa, none; and nothing on abstracts, all set up as counter claims.

The jury found in the sum of \$415.50 for the plaintiff on the note, including the \$300 note, interest, \$29.50, and attorney's fees, \$75.

OREGON TOWNS TO LOSE PERMITS

UNLESS ACTION IS TAKEN BY NEWBERG, BRANDON, PRINEVILLE AND KLAMATH FALLS STATE WATER BOARD TO ACT

SALEM, June 22.—State Engineer Lewis has announced that unless a satisfactory showing is made before the next meeting of the state water board by Newberg, Brandon, Prineville and Klamath Falls, permits issued to them for the appropriation of water for a municipality will be cancelled.

"Owing to the lack of showing that work is being prosecuted with reasonable diligence the permits of these cities are in danger of being cancelled," said Lewis. "Under the rules of the water board, they are subject to cancellation, but it was decided at the last meeting of the board to defer action in order to give the cities an opportunity to perfect their rights."

"Repeated requests for information relative to construction work and use of water have been ignored by the municipalities, and unless some evidence of activity in connection with these appropriations is submitted before the next meeting, the water board will proceed to cancel the permits."

"The Klamath Falls project is the largest of the four, contemplating the use of over fifteen second feet from the Aspen Lake watershed. The Brandon right covers five second feet from South Two Mile Creek."

Klamath Falls has abandoned its work on the Aspen Lake proposition. The matter was before the old council several weeks ago, and it was thought then that the permits had been cancelled.

Photo Taken Four Months Ago of Eruption of Volcano Which Destroyed Nation's Capital at Its Base



San Salvador, capital of the nation of that name of the western coast of the Central American isthmus, was destroyed by an earthquake and an eruption of the great volcano El Salvador, along with six other cities. This photograph is perhaps the last taken of the volcano in eruption. Hamilton M. Wright, the well-known traveller and author of a "Handbook of the Philippines," one of the best works on the island, took the picture on a recent trip. He was fortunate enough to reach San Salvador while the smoke poured from the mountain. More than 200 persons in San Salvador have lost their lives through earthquakes of volcanic eruptions during the last two years.
