WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—Englewood, New Jersey, a residential community, has collected over five times its Red Cross apportionment and stands first on the list of honor cities.

All Klamath county, and especially the outside districts, are invited to the big shirt waist dance at the Elks Temple Monday evening, for the Red Cross benefit, where the total reports for the week's work will be turned in by the various committees.

Steady progress is being made in all parts of the county by those at work to raise the \$11,000 in Klamath county, and while the fund is constantly swelling at the rate of \$1,200 a day, a tremendous effort will have to be made to get the desired sum by the close of the canvass Monday.

For wholehearted devotion to Red Cross work, Pine Grove last night set an example that all sections of the state might be proud to imitate. The keenest interest was shown in the remarks of the speakers who addressed the meeting in the Pine Grove school house, and after talks by E. B. Hall, H. D. Mortenson, Captain W. F. Arant and C. F. Stone, the ladies of the district served a most inviting lunch of sandwiches, cake and coffee, all interspersed with the best of feeling and good cheer. So engrossed were all present with the interesting work of the Red Cross that the meeting did not break up until midnight.

One of the happy incidents of the evening was the donation of a birthday cake to the Red Cross by little 7-year-old June Bradbury. This was sold at auction several times, and purchased by the generous people of Pine Grove for the total sum of \$12.50, which amount was turned over by Miss June to the Red Cross, the young lady being the youngest member of that organization in Pine Grove. Another cake was auctioned and re-auctioned, until the Red Cross was richer in the sum of \$1, making a total for the district of \$168.65.

Ellis Young, and Mrs. Orb Campbell, was highly praised by Chairman Charles Mack, the speakers of the evening and all present. CRATER LAKE SUPPER IS PART OF PLAN

Contest for Goddess of Liberty Proceeding—Closes Next Friday Night—One Candidate Withdraws. Others Receiving Votes—Fort Klamath People Clear Snow for Road to Crater Rim.

Announcement by Chairman W. P. Johnson that Bishop "Matt" Hughes of Portland will be one of the speakers at the Strahorn dedication here July 3rd is news that has just been received with great satisfaction by the committee in charge of this ceremony. Credit for securing this prominent and popular speaker is due to Rev. George Bennett of the Grace Methodist church of this city, who has followed the trail of the bishop with telegrams throughout the East for some time. His wire received today from Portland states that he will be on hand for the occasion.

Bishop Matthew Simpson Hughes is a man of national reputation, who has served as pastor of several of the largest Methodist pastorates in the United States; Los Angeles, Topeka, Kans., Minneapolis, Minn., and Boston, Mass., being among his charges. It is felt that Bishop Hughes' appearance on the program here will add much to the impressiveness of the event commemorated.

Klamath Falls people and her visitors to the Fourth of July and Railroad Day celebration, July 3-4, are going to have an opportunity to eat supper on the rim of Crater Lake Sunday night, July 1st, thru the work and courtesy of the Fort Klamath and Wood River Valley, according to Paul Johnson, chairman of the celebration committee, at least two weeks before the road to the park would ordinarily be open to the public.

The route will be up Sand Creek canyon, and the Fort Klamath committee in charge has had bobbeds and cutters running over the road for several days already, to break up the snow as much as possible.

As soon as practical they will put a large number of plows on this road to break up the snow so that it will melt to open the road, and there is no doubt, according to Mr. Johnson, that the road will be open for this unique feature set among the snow-clad mountains on the rim of the famous Crater Lake and on a road thru one continuous snowbank.

The details and plans for this are rapidly being worked out, and will be completely announced later.

This work is the contribution of the Fort Klamath people to the Fourth of July celebration fund, said Mr. Johnson today.

Recent travelers over the road to the rim say that it will probably be the middle of July before this road is open to automobiles, and altho the snow is going rapidly now, the late and heavy winter storms will probably delay the opening.

NEW YORK CITY ITALIAN WANTED CAUGHT IN ITALY

COCCHI, MURDERER OF YOUNG U. S. GUNNERS SHOOT FROM OFF U-BOAT GIRL, CONFESSES

Alfredo Cocchi, who fled to Italy following disappearance of Ruth Cruger, arrested June 20—Breaks Down Under Close Questioning of Italian Judge—Gives Jealousy as Reason for Crime.

By Associated Press BOLOGNA, Italy, June 23.—Alfredo Cocchi, fugitive New York motorcycle dealer, has abandoned the pretense of his innocence, and has confessed to the murder of Ruth Cruger, the 18-year-old New York high school girl, whose body was found in his cellar recently. He was arrested June 20th.

He gives jealousy as the motive. He declared that he was unable to win her love, and became furious when she rebuffed him. Cocchi is a married man.

Cocchi broke down under the searching questions put to him by Judge Spucini, cried, and became greatly agitated.

He had claimed that he met her last few days before her disappearance in February, when she went to his shop to have her shoes sharpened.

SECOND CAPTAIN REPORTS VICTORY OVER SUBMARINE

AN ATLANTIC PORT—June 23—The captain of an American freight steamer which arrived here today reports that his steamer fought a battle with a submarine on June 6th, one day out from Genoa, Italy.

The naval gunners fired four shots and scored one hit, he said, knocking the periscope into the air. This is the second encounter reported in two days, in which Americans have successfully defended themselves against submarines.
