PRO-GERMANS TRY STOP A BREAK

ENDEAVOR TO SUPPRESS MEXICAN CITY PAPERS FROM ADVOCATING A BREAK WITH THE GERMANS.

MEXICO CITY, June 23.—It is reported that Germans and pro-Germans are exerting every possible pressure, including financial offers, to stop the newspaper El Universal's campaign for the severance of relations between Mexico and Germany. It is charged that pro-German papers aided in the campaign against America, and used free print paper supplied by American firms. Telegraph news, written obviously to misrepresent America, comes from New York, and apparently has no difficulty in passing the censor.

HOOVER DESIRES EVERYONE TO TRY ECONOMY

WRITES 200,000 PRAECHEES TO PRAECHE JULY 1ST

Desires to Reach Women and Children of Country—Monday, June 25th, Begins Plan of Food Saving Day—Reduce Waste is Great Wish. Must Produce Generously to Supply Ourselves and Allies

The following letter has been received from Herbert Hoover, national food administrator:

"I write to ask your special co-operation in an important phase of the work of conserving food for ourselves and our allies. The plan I now have in mind is designed primarily to reach the church people and the women, but with the help of the press it can be made to cover the whole community.

"Under date of June 18th there will be mailed to every minister whose name I can secure a personal letter over my signature, asking him to preach upon the subject of Food Conservation on Sunday, July 1st. In the same letter I shall express the hope that this day will become known as 'Food Saving Day,' and that it may be made to serve the purpose and motto of every household in America to save the waste and win the war.

"May I have your assistance along the following lines: First, on Monday, June 25th (but not before) and on succeeding days, to announce in your paper the general plan for Food Saving Day, with whatever local arrangements for observing it may be decided upon, and to support it editorially.

"Second, on Monday, July 2 (but not before) and on succeeding days, to carry in display type the motto: 'Save the Waste and Win the War,' to print also notes or abstracts of sermons preached on July 1st, and most important of all, to drive home the lessons of food conservation by your own editorial comment.

"I should be especially grateful if your influence and that of your paper could be used to enlist civic, fraternal, patriotic and other organizations in the effort to make Food Saving Day really effective in conserving the food supply for us and for our allies, and in reducing the cost of living to our own people."

Herbert C. Hoover, national food director, has mailed a letter to 200,000 pastors of individual churches, Catholic, Protestant and Jewish, calling upon them to co-operate with him and with the department of agriculture in urging the largest possible production of food and the smallest amount of waste.

"As a minister of God," writes Mr. Hoover, "a leader of the people and a lover of liberty and of your fellow men, your co-operation is earnestly desired and greatly needed. In such a time as this the people naturally turn to the church. It will be a calamity to the nation and to the churches if their chosen ministers neglect to exercise their proper leadership in this great cause of feeding a world in need. For the world is in want of food.

"To meet the needs of the war and of the world, we must produce generously, give freely to our allies, ourselves eat as much, but no more than we need, and especially save the waste. Lasting disgrace will fall upon us if lack of self-restraint should prevent us from taking our proper part in this great conflict against the doctrine of 'might makes right.'"

Mr. Hoover estimates the annual waste of food at one billion dollars. He urges a larger use of corn and corn bread in the family ration.

"The women of America," says Mr. Hoover, "have never failed to answer such a call as comes to them now. The saving of food is within their sphere, and without food conservation we cannot win the war."

All pastors are urged to preach upon the conservation of food, Sunday, July 1st, which is designated as Food Saving Day, and to secure the co-operation of religious and civic bodies in a campaign for food saving.

Mr. Hoover's 200,000 letters are sent to pastors through the agency of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, accompanied by a brief supplementary appeal by Dr. Frank Mason North, president of the council.

First American Liner to Ram a German Submarine



The American line steamship Kronland on her last trip to Great Britain sank a German submarine by ramming her. Other American vessels which have come in with reports of having sunk submarines told of firing on them. In this case the vessel turned on the U-boat and ran over her, smashing her to bits.

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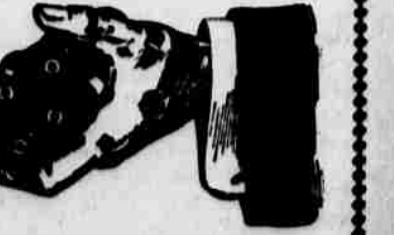
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
