Trans-Atlantic Air Line Pictured By Speaker

LONDON, June 16.—(Correspondence)—A trans-Atlantic line of airplanes carrying passengers between New York and London in two days, at a total cost of about \$1 a mile was predicted by G. Holt Thomas, in an address which he delivered before the Aeronautical Society of Great Britain.

To complete the rosy forecast, prophetic films were displayed, showing the departure and voyage of a trans-Atlantic airplane, and also the dropping of mail pouches at postal air stations between London and the North of England.

Mr. Thomas, who has had large experience in flying and building aircraft, said that airplane mail service could be established commercially. "A special aeroplane will enable the business man to leave London in the morning, transact his business in Paris, and be home to dinner again," he said. "It will take him to Bagdad in a day and a half or to New York in two days."

The cost from London to Paris, he added, would be just over a dollar a mile, running one machine each way, and with four machines it would work out at 75 cents. A profitable charge for passengers would be \$25. A mail letter of one ounce could be profitably carried for one cent, and three pound parcels for 75 cents. A passenger could go from London to Marseilles in eight hours instead of twenty-three, at a cost of \$50 or

Constantinople could be reached in twenty hours for \$125 a passenger, and mails at 5 cents an ounce. Dealing with farther distances he pictured Ceylon as being only two and three-quarter days from London, Tokio four and a half days, Sydney five days, Capetown three and a half days, and Vancouver three days.

Lord Cowdray, the chairman of the meeting, said he believed Mr. Thomas' estimate of costs to be near the mark, and that it would not exceed a dollar per mile. In his opinion commercial flying was bound to come and come quickly, and it would not require government assistance after the first five or six years.

ADVERS BOARD OF HEALTH SLIGHTED

DR. ROBERG ACCUSES LEGISLATURE OF CUTTING FUND NEED-ED TO KEEP STATE HEALTHY IN ADDRESS TODAY

PORTLAND, June 28.—The last Oregon legislature should not have slashed the appropriation for the state medical board," declared Dr. David N. Roberg, Portland, state medical officer and secretary of the Oregon board of health, in an address delivered at the forty-third annual convention of the Oregon State Medical Association, which opened here today with delegates in attendance from many sections of the state.

"The legislature appropriated \$45,000 to advertise Oregon through the East and to bring people here," Dr. Roberg continued. "Then it turned around and cut down our funds so we can't make the state healthy for visitors after they arrive."

The officers of the association are Dr. Robert C. Yenny, Portland, president; Dr. Leo Chilton, Canyon City, first vice president; Dr. Everett Mings, Marshfield, second vice president; Dr. Clarence J. McCusker, Portland, secretary, and Katherine C. Manion, Portland, treasurer.

KIRK REPORTS ON HIS TRIP TO WASHINGTON

(Continued from page 1)

while leaving the Indians themselves inactive with regard to the management of their tribal affairs.

"Fifth, Our inherent right of self government is being withheld from us by the Indian Office.

Sixth, While congress is willing to enact laws for the benefit of the Indians, and as a rule is in sympathy with the Indians, the initial steps are left to the Indian Office, upon the theory that the Indian Office is acting as our legal guardian.

"Seventh, The Indian Office is opposed to Indians employing attorneys or having legal counsel of their own choice, thereby depriving the Indians of the privilege of getting important knowledge and of the benefit of presenting their contentions and claims in the most forcible and conclusive way. "Eighth, It seems that, notwithstanding our contention for the right to have some jurisdiction and voice in the matter of supervising our tribal and individual affairs, we are handicapped by being under the jurisdiction of the Indian Office; that we are to a large extent helpless, without legal counsel; that we should make a united effort to overcome this disadvantage and continue to strive for the right until we have gained recognition from the government of our right to have and to hold the tribal property and the right to manage our own affairs, whether tribal or individual, under state or federal laws, and with the aid of legal counsel, if we desire it.

"It is evident that if we are to make any impression upon the department and upon congress in these matters, a positive aggressive stand must be made by the Indians, and specific facts pressed to the attention of the commissioner and of the Indian committees. Preparation for this should be made at once, and the whole situation carefully worked out by us at home so as to make the presentation of facts clear and our views on the subject as nearly convincing as possible.

"It is my belief that we shall be compelled to accept the departmental management and control of our tribal estate, without questioning its wisdom, only so long as we carelessly

neglect to take an active interest in the same.

"As soon as we in an organized way are able to convince the department and congress that we have an intelligent, accurate knowledge on the subject, that we know what our property is, how it is managed, what mismanagement, if any, has characterized the department's control, what we have illegally or unfairly deprived of by reason of governmental mismanagement, what now endangers our tribal welfare; and especially when we can show, as we can, that within the membership of the tribes there are persons themselves capable of advising those entrusted by the government with the control of our property, it will be possible to gain recognition at Washington such as has been denied up to this time.

"It is hoped that this report will have the effect of stimulating in the members of the tribe a disposition to have more careful inquiry made into the details of administration of our tribal property; that they will be convinced of the value of a more effective organization of the tribe so as to put into operation whatever power, authority or ability is pos-

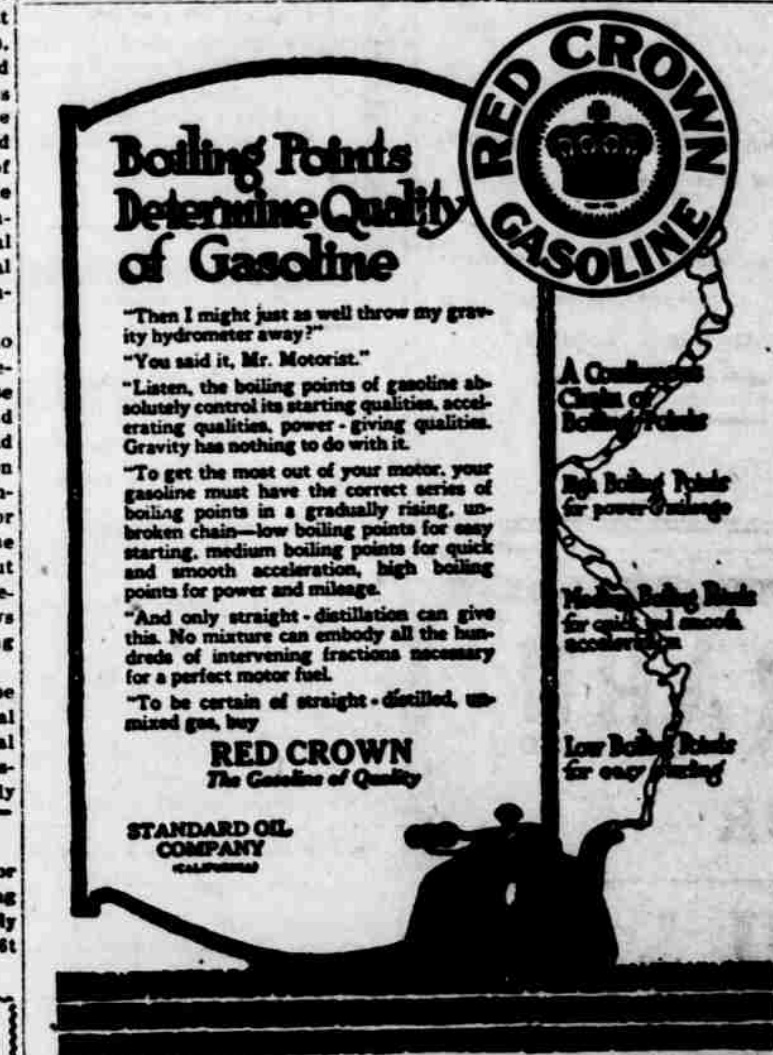
sessed by the tribe, the false idea that the Indians are without power, and that they must quietly submit, without remonstrance, to whatever is done by those in charge of their tribal affairs, whether they approve or not.

"In my opinion, the Klamath Indians will not be in a position to conduct their affairs intelligently and successfully until there is a capable committee composed of members of the tribe duly authorized and empowered to look after these matters, and adequately assisted by legal counsel, responsible to no authority whatsoever, except the authority of the Klamath Tribes, independent of all obligations, except that of due respect to official authority, and bound to stand up for the enforcement of every inherent tribal right; of every right expressly granted to the tribe and the members thereof by law; and where adequate tribal or individual right is denied by those in authority, to secure such modification of the law as will give the Indian, to all intents and purposes, as much protection in all respects as any other citizen of the United States possesses. The question of further allotments on the Klamath reservation was dis-

cussed by me a number of times with the Indian Office during my stay and was finally submitted by the commissioner to the Secretary's office where it was pending when I left for home."
