EPIDEMIC AMONG FRENCH HORSES

STRANGE MALADY ATTACKS A GREAT NUMBER OF FRENCH CAVALRY HORSES — VETERINARIANS MYSTIFIED

TOULOUSE, France, June 30.—Cavalry horses have been dying in large numbers from a mysterious disease in different regions of the south of France. The mortality has reached 40 per cent to 70 per cent of new contingents arriving at Toulouse, Albi, Bordeaux, Narbonne and Perpignan. Horses apparently sound and well when they are unloaded from the cars die so soon after being stabled that it is impossible to treat them. This situation dates from 1914, soon after the declaration of war. The mortality was greatest in the spring of 1915, and it is still alarming.
 Horse dealers and veterinaries of Toulouse have been unable to account for this strange epidemic. Some veterinarians assume it is an infectious influenza; others suspect that a subtle means of slow poisoning is practiced on the animals while en route from the farm to the cavalry depot.

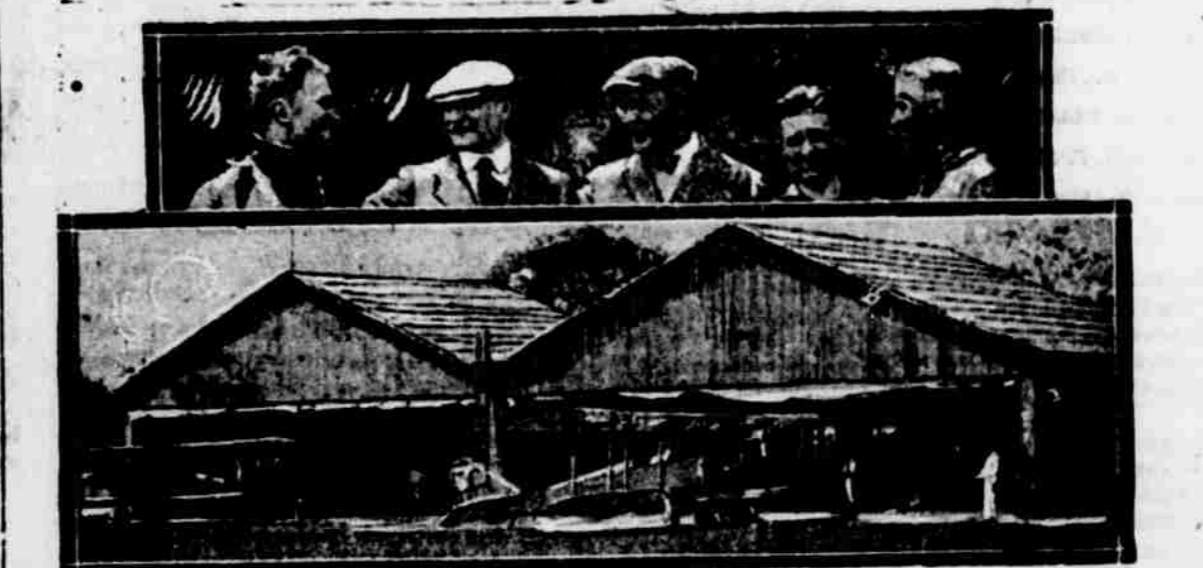
Wife Slayer Chooses, Death by Shooting

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 30. Howard De Weese, sentenced to death for the slaying of his wife last September, has chosen to be shot rather than hanged at the law's hands, July 6th. He is resigned to his fate, and says he hopes that no steps will be taken to gain a new trial or a reprieve.

The laws of Utah provide that a person sentenced to death may choose the way to die. Before deciding upon being shot, De Weese asked a prison guard questions relative to the caliber of the bullets, stating that he did not want the marksmen to "play" with him, but to make death instantaneous.
 De Weese eloped with the wife of Harry W. Fisher, haberdasher, from New York. They went to Reno and Pacific Coast cities to live. Last September the pair, who had married at Reno, after Mrs. Fisher obtained a divorce, came to Salt Lake City.
 A few days later neighbors became suspicious, and the apartment was entered. They discovered the body of Mrs. De Weese, her features smashed by a flatiron, which lay on the bed beside her.
 A few months later De Weese surrendered to the Chicago police. In the interval between his surrender and trial, he confessed to numerous burglaries, and boasted that he was the greatest diamond thief of the last decade. He asserted that his wife was slain by robbers with whom he formerly associated, who had tracked him and his wife to Salt Lake City, and when he was out committed the murder to obtain \$12,000 worth of jewels which De Weese said he had stolen.
