McKimens Writes of Training Experience

The following letter from Frank G. McKimens, one of Klamath Falls' first recruits at the United States naval training station, San Francisco, to Mrs. J. Frank Adams, will be read with great interest by his local friends, as it gives a clear idea of the everyday life of our naval volunteers. The letter follows in part:

"I know the people of Klamath Falls are interested in the sailor boys of the United States navy, and, of course I don't intend to do anything to cause a lessening of the friendly feeling which they bear for us."

"I stayed in Portland all week, and studied every line, and finally decided, as at first, that I knew the right trail at first, so the following Monday I was sworn in and had my finger prints taken, etc., and started for Frisco that evening with twenty-six other boys, most of them in my company now. I stayed in the detention camp for just one week, and have been at the main barracks ever since. We drilled hard for about a month, and are now what is known as the Island Patrol, a guard stationed around the island to guard it night and day."

"I was one of the sixteen men, two squads, from D4, to give three performances every afternoon in the Imperial theater in San Francisco, to help in the enlistment there. I sure enjoyed it, and considered it quite an honor, for it required special and hard study, and we had to be extra neat and clean, but it was all for

the best, as cleanliness is a most important requisite in the navy anywhere."

"I like the training fine, and would not have missed it for anything. The discipline is strict, but seems to be all for the best so far, so think I'll get along splendidly."

"I was apprentice seaman for nearly two weeks, and received \$17 per month; then I was rated as seaman second class, at \$20.00, and after June 1st I got a \$20 raise, so I can't kick at all. We never entered the navy with the idea of getting a fortune, anyway."

"Everything is intensely interesting and instructions are generally quite specific, so we can get at least a fair idea of how and what to do. We drill, sweep, wash clothes, do K. P. duty, guard duty, have boat practice, knots and splicing, etc., and have almost every kind of game or music to amuse ourselves when not detailed at something else. There are two pianos and one organ here, and nearly all the time one or more are in use. All kinds of ball games are played, and there is a good gym to exercise in. A good library to read and write in is surely enjoyed by most of the sailors. The cats are very good, and well cooked and served. Most of the men coming here now are tradesmen."

"I saw Nelson Hall and Graves and a few others, the most of the boys left before I came to the main barracks, and so I didn't see them after I left Portland."
