FRENCH CRUISER SUNK WEDNESDAY

CRUISER KLEBER STRIKES MINE OFF POINT ST. MATTHEW AND GOES DOWN WITH THREE OFFICERS AND THIRTYFIVE MEN

PARIS, June 30.—The French armored cruiser Kleber struck a mine off Point St. Matthew Wednesday and sank.

Three officers and thirty-five men were lost, according to official announcement received today.

The Kleber was bound for Brest from Dakar, Africa.

The Kleber was built at Bordeaux in 1903, at a cost of \$3,650,000. She was 426 feet long and was manned by 500 men when launched.
