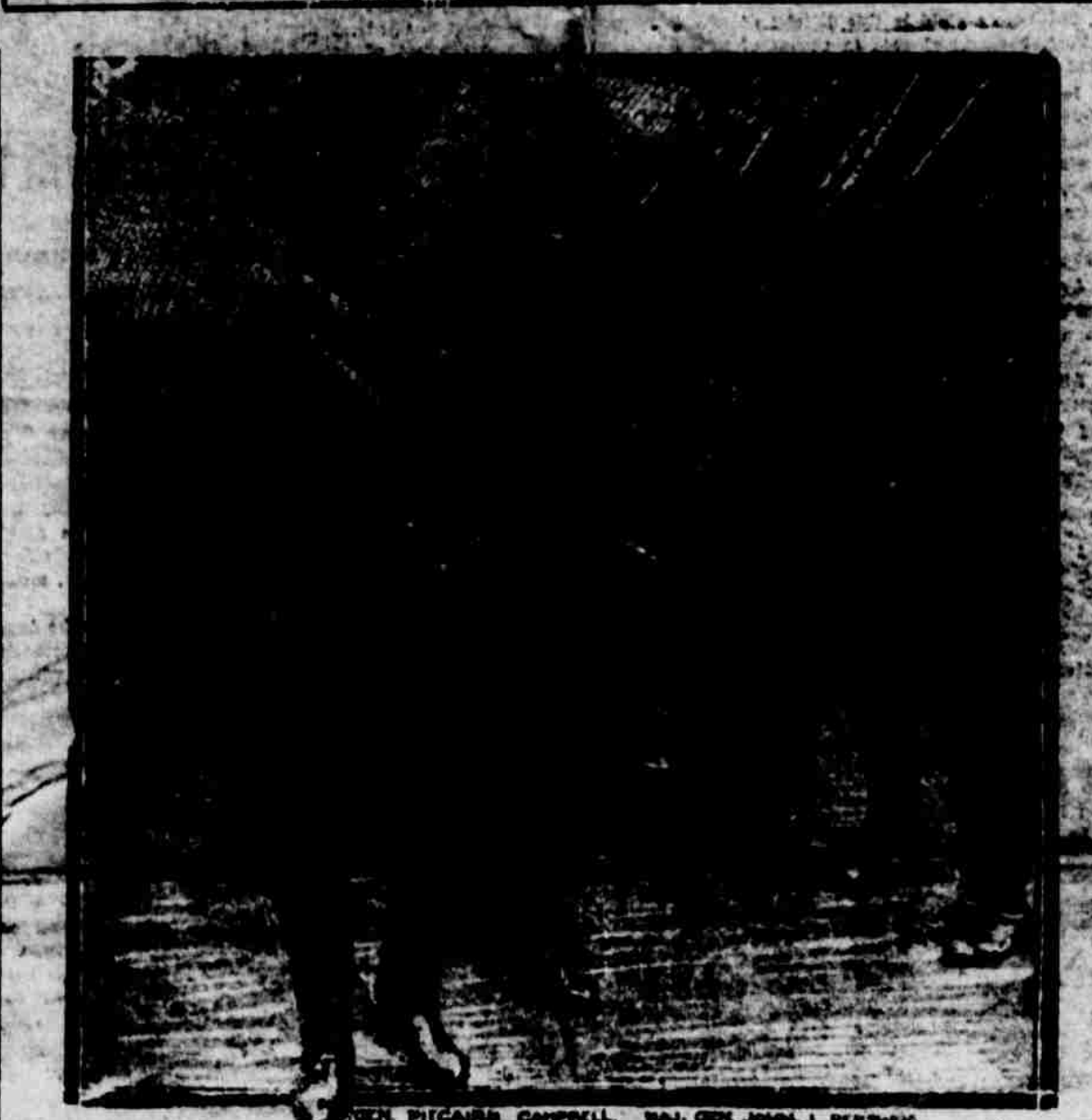

DRAFT RULES ISSUED TODAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—The regulations governing the selection of the new army have been issued and specify no class exemptions under the draft.
Each case is to be decided separately by the local exemption board, which will pass upon all exemption claims, except those based upon industrial or agricultural occupations.

PROHI ATTACKS WILSON'S ACTION

CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL COMMITTEE SAYS NATION WIDK PROHIBITION WOULD BE BUT FOR PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—Virgil G. Hinshaw, chairman of the national committee of the prohibition party, has issued a statement attacking Wilson's action in asking the prohibition leaders not to delay the passage of the food control bill by insisting on retention of the provisions affecting the manufacture of beer and light wines.
'We undoubtedly would have had national prohibition within thirty days but for the interference of Wilson in coming to the rescue of the brewers in the final hour,' declared the statement.

RACE RIOTS ON IN ST. LOUIS

TWO NEGROES KILLED AFTER BRING PULLED OFF STREET CARS—GUARD DOES LITTLE. VIOLENCE INCREASES

EAST ST. LOUIS, July 2.—Two negroes were taken from a street car today, and one was clubbed to death and the other shot to death. A white man standing before his store was killed by a stray bullet in the beginning of an active race war.
The race riots increased in turbulence during the afternoon today. Rioters pulled trolleys off the wires, stopping street cars, then pulled the negroes from the cars.
Riots were taken away from sixteen militiamen, while women pulled black women from cars and sent them away screaming.
The mob cheered when a negro who was shot was placed in an ambulance.
National Guardsmen stood by, apparently doing nothing to curb the disturbance.
Saloons have been closed until further notice.

GERMANS AMAZED AT U. S. FORCES

NEW HOURS AFTER EXPEDITION LANDED WAS IN CAMP—GERMAN PRISONERS HELP MAKE READY FOR THEM

A FRENCH SEAPORT, July 2.—Only a few hours after the arrival of the American expedition, the men were established in camp.
They were assisted in preparing their quarters by a few score of amazed German prisoners, most of whom refused to believe that the Americans had actually come to fight their countrymen.

RUSSIANS AGAIN ACTIVE IN WAR AGAINST ENEMY

ARMY RESUMED ACTIVITY ON JULY 1ST

Point Captured on Galician Front With 2,400 Men and 104 Officers. Capture Seven Heavy Guns Against Turks and Over 10,000 Prisoners Sunday—Germans Had Claimed Russian Losses Heaviest During War.

BERGSRAD, July 2.—Minister of War Karginsky has telegraphed Premier Lwow that the Russian revolutionary army resumed its offensive July 1st, and that the Russians have captured Kosulsky, on the Galician front.

With 104 officers and 2,400 men was the point captured, according to the communication made by the war ministry.
The Russians have advanced to the Kosulsky stream and captured several heavy guns yesterday in a continued offensive against the Turks. In the Cosmova district they occupied the village of Hugijska.
Over 10,000 prisoners were captured in the various sectors on Sunday.

BERLIN, July 2.—A German staff statement says that the Russian losses yesterday have surpassed any hitherto known. Some Russian units were entirely dispersed, says the report.

CIVIL WAR IS AGAIN STARING CHINA IN FACE

MILITARISTS DEMAND MANCHU DYNASTY BACK

Coup d'Etat Comes at Time When Peace Was Being Restored—Believed President Will Resist Ultimatum—Believed Northern Provinces Backing Militarists and Southern WHI Fight if Forced.

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 2.—General Chang Heung and other military leaders have demanded a restoration of the Manchu dynasty in China of President Li, according to state department advices.

A civil war is feared if the militarists have the power behind them they seem to have.
The coup d'etat came at a time when peace was being restored in China. It is believed the president will resist an ultimatum as long as it is possible.
All provinces south of the Yangtze are expected to revolt in case of a Manchu restoration.
It is believed the northern provinces are backing the militarists. Shung Shi-Chang, guardian of the boy emperor, is supporting Houan.
China's entry in to the war is believed to be practically out of the question.

KLAMATH DROPS FIRST OF SERIES
