SERIAL NUMBERS WILL BE GIVEN TO REGISTERED MEN. NUMBERS TO BE POSTED PUBLICLY.

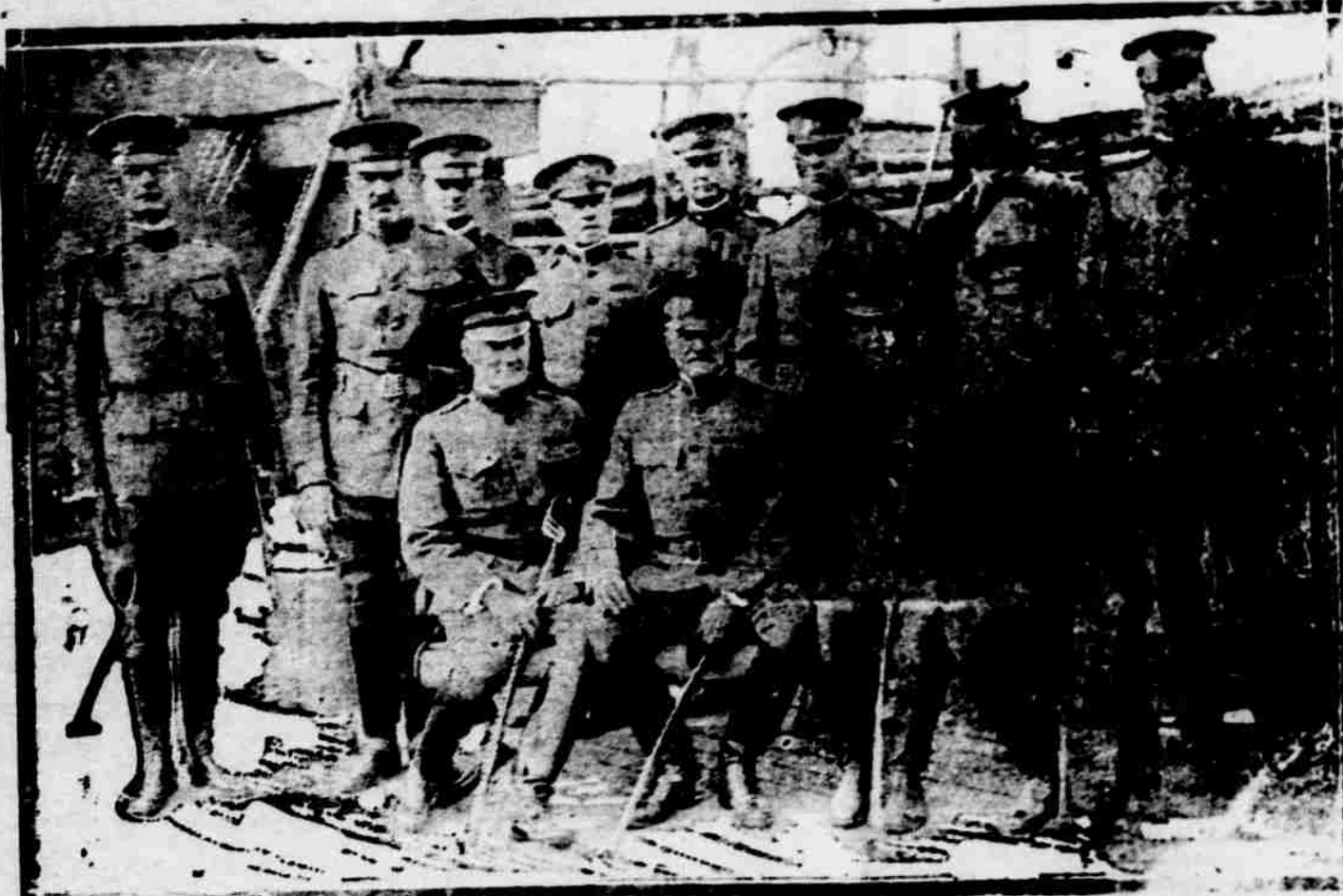
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5.—Exemption boards which will administer draft selection have begun giving serial numbers to registered men. The numbers will be posted publicly as soon as given.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS BECOMING SERIOUS

PORTLAND, July 5.—Drought conditions were becoming serious at the end of last week throughout Oregon, with the exception of the coast counties, where rain has fallen, according to the summary of crop conditions thruout the state for the week ending June 30, issued here today by the weather bureau. The summary follows:
"Beneficial rains occurred in the coast counties, but elsewhere in localities drought conditions were becoming serious and the shortage of rains for the past month was beginning to be felt by late sown cereals, and more particularly by crops in light soils.
Barley was beginning to ripen in Eastern counties, corn was being cultivated and making rapid growth, potatoes and rye generally were in good condition, but needed moisture, owing wheat was only fair and suffering for straw, while sugar beets and
