Shoots at Deer and Kills His Neighbor

JACKSON COUNTY MAN KILLS HIS BEST FRIEND WHEN HE SHOOTS AT DEER. The first hunting tragedy of the season is reported. David Elmer Cottrell, a well known rancher of Jackson County, was accidentally shot and killed last Wednesday by his life-long friend and companion, Lane Wyland. The two men, who had formerly been partners in the cattle business, were on the range to salt their stock and carried guns primarily for use against predatory animals. They had separated, and Wyland seeing a movement in the brush, stopped and made out the head and horns of a deer, at which he fired. On reaching the spot he discovered he had fatally wounded his friend, who had killed the deer earlier, and was skinning it. Cottrell was of a well known family, and was a former student in the Ashland Normal school.

Question of American Athletics is Undecided

NEW YORK, July 6.—As the result of sober second thought several of the national sport governing bodies of the country have reached the conclusion that they acted rather hastily in abandoning various national championship meets. In the case of the Amateur Athletic Union the matter was put to a mail vote before any decision was announced, and the returns showed an overwhelming vote in favor of staging the track and field games under the same conditions prevailing in normal times. The annual championship meet will therefore be held as usual, but some uncertainty still exists regarding the date and place for the games. They were originally set for St. Louis on August 31, September 1 and 3. St. Louis athletic officials, however, are not positive at this time that the meet can be properly staged there, and should this prove to be the case, the championship games will be awarded to some other athletic center. New York, Chicago and Philadelphia are all understood to be willing to assume the task of holding the meet in case St. Louis decides to forego the contests. The championship committee also has decided that the regular A. A. U. die medals shall be awarded to first, second and third men to win places in both the track and field events as in past years. It was the general opinion that since the games were to be held the regular championship trophies should be awarded, instead of the certificates planned in connection with the suggested patriotic meet. Walter Camp, dean of Yale football authorities, has suggested that in order to settle the question as to whether football shall be played this fall or not, a circular letter be sent to graduates, asking them to subscribe for seats in case they favor the retention of the game. He points out that if conditions should be such as to prevent the contests, provisions might be made that the sums necessary to reserve seats could be applied to other sources, such as the continuation of teachers' salaries.

CENSUS SHOWS GERMAN GAINS

MISSTATEMENT OF YOUNG WOMEN AS TO AGE MAKES CENSUS REPORT OF EUROPE DISPROPORTIONATE

LONDON, July 6.—The final report on the census, which was taken in 1911, and which has just been issued, shows a total population of 420,882,558, of which 315,156,396 were in India, and 45,221,615 in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The population of Ireland continues to decrease, France is stationary, but there has been a remarkable fall in the growth of the populations of Norway and Scotland. Germany shows the highest rate of increase in Europe, while in the British empire abnormal rates of growth are shown in Canada and New Zealand. In all English counties births in the ten intercensal years outnumbered deaths, yet in six—London, Cumberland, Westmoreland, Cardigan, Radnor and Montgomery—the population decreased, showing the losses by migration. As a consequence, it is charged, of willful misstatement of age, the number of women in the groups aged 20-25 and 25-30 are disproportionately high. There is a striking increase in the number of public entertainers, which the report says is due largely to moving picture shows.

For the first time in the history of the state, every county in Oregon will be represented, Secretary A. H. Lee announced.

BREAD COUPONS ARE ISSUED IN SWEDEN

STOCKHOLM, June 23.—(Correspondence)—"Voluntary Bread Saving Bureaus" have been established in many of the Swedish cities. Persons who find it possible to get along with less bread than the amount allowed are asked to send the unused coupons of their bread cards to these bureaus. Supplementary bread cards to the value of the coupons received are issued to the poorer inhabitants. Coupons thus received by the Stockholm bureau alone have made possible the issuance of additional supplementary cards for four tons of bread. A. F. Clabine, a prominent rancher in the Merrill country, who has been ill for some time, is reported in a very low state, and grave doubts are entertained for his recovery.

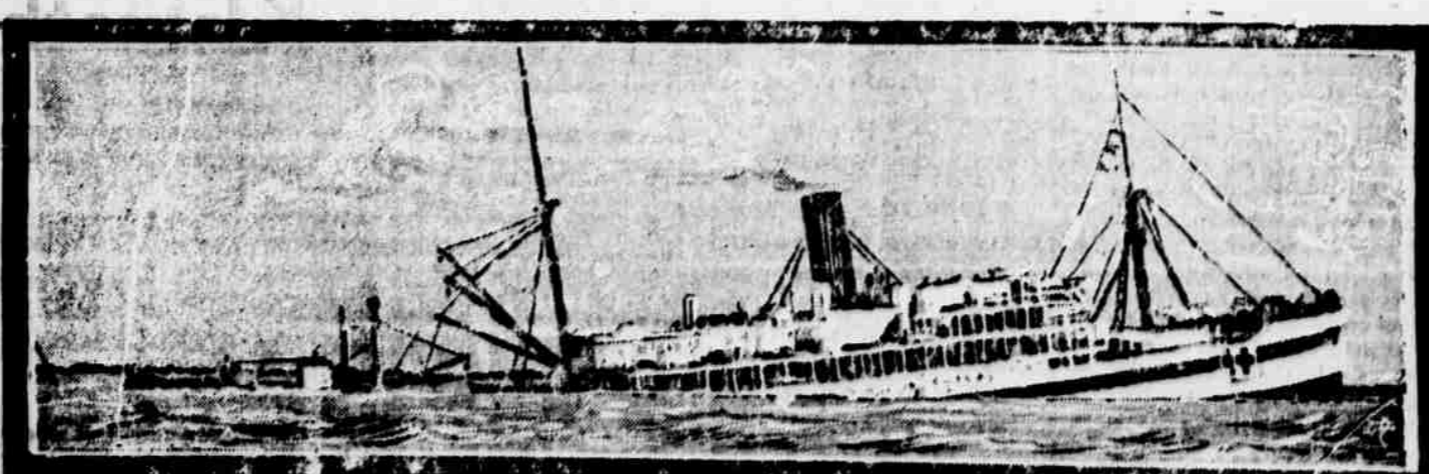
