

Seattle's Canal Now Dedicated

ADJACENT LAKES ARE ADDED
TO HARBOR FACILITIES—COST
IS OVER FIVE MILLION DOL-
LARS, BUT BENEFIT IS GREAT

SEATTLE, July 6.—The principal features of the Independence Day celebration in Seattle was the formal observance of the opening of Lake Washington canal, connecting Lakes Washington and Union with the salt water of Puget Sound, and making these deep lakes a portion of Seattle harbor, and available to the largest merchant ships in the world.

There was a parade of steam and power boats from Puget Sound to Lake Washington, through the government locks, led by the fisheries steamer Roosevelt, formerly Peary's North Pole ship. At two points there were speaking programs.

So far as the United States government is concerned, the canal was completed a year ago, and the toll free locks, with a length of 825 feet, have been in operation since last summer, but not until last month did the city complete the Fremont bascule bridge across that portion of the canal which connects Salmon Bay with Lake

Union. A city bridge across the channel between Lake Union and Lake Washington is still uncompleted, but a temporary lift bridge enables vessels to pass through.

The total cost of the canal has been \$5,000,000, borne by the federal, state, county and city governments. The locks are capable of lifting larger ships than are those of any government canal except that at Panama. It is expected that many merchant and war vessels will use the locks on account of the fresh water, good anchorage and absence of tides, and that the fishing fleets will lie in the fresh water during the winter. Lake Washington is twenty-five miles long.

Soldiers Feet Are Well Looked After by Officers

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Drug stores in the vicinity of the reserve officers' training camp here are doing what is familiarly termed a land office business.

The period of short sharp marches is on, and there are many severe inspections of feet. Yards of adhesive tape are disappearing with amazing speed from the drug store shelves, while talcum powder is being sold pound after pound. The feet of every man are examined before the march, and the taping and powdering process begins at that time. If there is any indication of wear at the end of the march, the pedal extremities of the rookies are given another plaster of tape and shower of powder.

In view of the big demand, the commissary tents have been well stocked with everything that will make marching easier and yet not "baby" the feet of the rookie. The officers have no desire to make a man's feet so soft by treatment that he will be unable to stand up under a sustained march. On the other hand, the slightest bruise of scratch is given close attention, and properly reinforced with tape and powder. The inspection of feet is one of the

amusing features of camp life, but the rookies realize the seriousness that is behind it, for battles, they are told by Major Edward L. Massee and the other experts on marching at the camp, are won by the side that can keep its feet as well as its head.

The socks must also be of a make that will not irritate or overheat the feet. One of the principal things the camp doctors have to combat is "scalded" feet, or feet which, although otherwise hardy, become inflamed when forced to do certain kinds of work. Several rookies, whose feet passed successfully in the initial examinations are finding out that good looking and good wearing pedal extremities are some times vastly different.

As a consequence of this close attention to feet, the Red Cross and other organizations making outfits for soldiers are being instructed to abide closely by the government regulations on socks and other foot and leg equipment.

The throngs of bare-footed men lined up for inspection in company formation, present an odd sight, but certainly show the good effect of this scrutiny, when they march.

SUB BOATS WILL BENEFIT COAST

HEAVY SHIPMENTS ACROSS PACIFIC TO RUSSIA WILL BE MADE TO AVOID ATLANTIC MENACE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—The German U-boat is adding daily to the world importance of the ports of Tacoma, Seattle, Portland, San Pedro, and according to a recent communication from the nation council of defense to the chamber of commerce here. The council states in this massive that the Pacific will doubtless escape the U-boat menace because of the difficulty of establishing hidden bases, and the vast range of water to be covered. As a result vast shipments to Russia and other points in the Far East, which would ordinarily go by way of New York, will be brought to the Pacific coast for delivery across the ocean.

In order to care for this vastly increased trade two large piers will be built at Vladivostok, Russia, and the terminals of the trans-Siberian railway will be enlarged.
