SENATE SUSTAINS FORMER ACTION

WILSON TO TAKE OVER DISTILLED BOND GOODS—POWER TO SUSPEND MANUFACTURE BEER AND WINES WITHHELD

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 9.—By a vote of 52 to 25, the senate refused to reconsider its favorable action upon Senator Smoot's amendment, proposing to direct the president to take over distilled beverages in bond upon compensating owners.

In a primary test vote upon authorizing the president to suspend the manufacture of beer and light wines the senate voted 46 to 34 against such power.

NO PETITIONS WILL BE FILED

OREGON RAILROADS DECIDE NOT TO ASK FOR FIFTEEN PER CENT INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES

SALEM, July 9.—Nine principal railroads advised the Public Service Commission today that they had decided to withdraw their petition for a 15 per cent increase in freight rates throughout Oregon.

Four logging road feeders, which still have petitions filed, will withdraw, and it is expected that no hearing will be held.

Resignation of Secretary Albert E. He leaves to continue his practice of law in the Odd Fellows building, and will act as attorney for the Water Users Association.

Mr. Wishard has been identified for some time with the association, and his knowledge of its affairs enables him to carry out the duties of his new office in a capable manner.
