

DRAFT NUMBERS ARE NOW POSTED

Drawing Will Be Made In Washington

EVERY MAN THAT IS REGISTERED SHOULD AT ONCE SECURE HIS NUMBER—ALL NAMES ARE POSTED AT THE COURT HOUSE—SERIAL NUMBER IS THE ONE THAT COUNTS, NUMBER ON REGISTRATION CARDS HAVING NO BEARING

The serial numbers of the men who have registered for the selective draft have been posted in the court house by the county exemption board. It is important that all registered men should ascertain their serial number, so that they may know at the earliest possible moment if they are included in the list when the numbers are announced from Washington.

drawn it will mean that approximately 30,000 men have been selected throughout the United States.

It should be distinctly understood that the certificate numbers on the cards of the men registered has no significance, and the only thing that counts is the serial number which has been placed on the card in each district since the registration.

Registrants should particularly watch for the drawing in Washington, then find out whether they were drawn and the order in which they must appear. Then they should learn when they must appear for physical examination. In case of any doubt they should report to the local exemption board, consisting of the sheriff, county clerk and health officer.

HIGH TARIFFS ON LOCAL RATES ARE DISCUSSED

SAN FRANCISCO RATE ATTORNEY MEETS LOCAL BODY

Discriminatory Class Rates to and From This City Most Unfortunate. First Class Rate to Klamath Falls Nearly Double That to Dorris. Interstate Commerce Commission Appealed to.

At a meeting of the Commercial Club last night, Mr. Bishop of Bishop & Bahler, San Francisco, explained that the railroad commission of California had ordered the Southern Pacific company to reduce the class rates from San Francisco to Dorris on first class to 97 cents, corresponding reductions on all the other classes. This reduction was to have been effective the latter part of last year, but the Southern Pacific company secured an injunction preventing the order from going into effect. This injunction, however, was dissolved June 28th, and the new rates will go into effect today.

The Southern Pacific company have refused to extend the reduction thru to Klamath Falls, saying that as Portland has now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission an application for a reduction in the class rates from Portland to Klamath Falls, basing their claims on the present low rates from San Francisco, any reduction from San Francisco would make Portland's case that much stronger.

The railroad commission of California only has jurisdiction in the state of California, and therefore can not force the Southern Pacific company to extend the reduced rates further than Dorris. If the Southern Pacific company would apply the combination rate figured over Dorris, the reduction to Klamath Falls would be 39 cents on first class, with corresponding reductions on the other classes. If same basis as prescribed by them was used thru Klamath Falls would get a reduction of 60 cents on first class, and corresponding reductions on the other classes.

Bishop & Bahler are filing at once a formal complaint with the Interstate Commerce Commission, asking for the 60 cent reduction, and feel that no doubt this reduction can be obtained.

MUST CONQUER SAYS HOLLWEG

GERMANY'S CHANCELLOR DECLARES PEACE WITHOUT ANNEXATION IS UNACCEPTABLE BEFORE REICHSTAG

BERNE, Switzerland, July 10.—"I repeat, that formula of peace without annexations is unacceptable to us," declared German Chancellor Bethman-Hollweg, in a speech to the reichstag members today. "We cannot declare our terms of peace. We must fight and conquer," he added.

LONDON, July 10.—It is reported in Amsterdam, says a telegraph exchange, that the kaiser has decided upon the resignations of Dr. Karl Helfferich, German vice chancellor, Secretary of the Interior and Dr. Alfred Zimmerman, German Secretary of Foreign Affairs.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Colonel Edward H. Green, who has probably received more proposals than any other man in America, has just been married to Miss Mabel E. Harlow of Highland Park, a suburb of this city. The bride is said to be very very wealthy in her own right.

Colonel Green gave the bride a wedding gift of \$625,000, \$500,000 in check and the remainder in Liberty Bonds. He said the newspapers had caused him to receive 9,000 proposals in the last fifteen years. He added that he married for something besides wealth. "Millions cannot buy a real home."

ARIZONA TOWN FIRES I. W. W.

CITIZENS CLEAN THE CITY OF INDUSTRIAL WORKMEN WITH THE AID OF RIFLES AND PICK HANDLES

JEROME, Ariz., July 10.—Hundreds of miners and citizens, some armed with rifles and others with pick handles, started at sunrise to clean the town of agitators who they considered as undesirable as a result of the strike called Friday by the Metal Miners branch of the Industrial Workers of the World. No violence has been reported. Apparently most of the I. W. W. learned of the plans and left town during the night. Sixty were put aboard a train going out of town.

BELGIANS ENJOY WESTERN TRIP

COMMISSION EXPRESSES PLEASURE AT NIGHT OF SHIPBUILDING UNDER WAY AT PORTLAND AT THIS TIME

PORTLAND, July 10.—The Belgian commissioners arrived this morning on a special train from Seattle.

They were taken for a trip thru the ship yards, lumber yards and over the Columbia highway.

STEAM ROLLER MAKES HEADWAY

MORE THAN SIX MILES PENETRATED IN TWO DAYS AROUND GALACIA, WEST OF STANISLAU, BY RUSSIANS

A number of villages were captured yesterday and over a thousand prisoners captured. The enemy has retreated to the Lomna River. In two days the Russians have penetrated to a depth of six and two-third miles into the enemy's positions west of Stanislaw.

BOSTON, July 10.—Fred Harper, a lawyer of Lynchburg, Va., was elected Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks Lodge here today. The next convention will be held at Atlantic City, in spite of the fact that Seattle wanted it badly. The convention adopted resolutions supporting President Wilson.

Chinese Ruler Asked to Quit



PRESIDENT LI YUAN HUNG The ruler of China, Li Yuan Hung, has been asked to retire from office by General Chang Hsun, military governor of Anhwei. The pronouncement declares that the former emperor is restored to the throne. Li Yuan Hung was vice president of China under the last president.

FORT KLAMATH SUFFERS HEAVY FIRE LOSSES

\$7,000 LOSS IS SUSTAINED BY NEIGHBORING TOWN

Fire Starts in George Hoyt's Machine Shop, Which is Consumed, Together With Adjoining Buildings—Automobiles and Gasoline in Garage Are Ruined in Time—Stock is Moved From Melhase's Store.

Considerable property was destroyed in Fort Klamath yesterday by a fire which started in the machine shop belonging to George Hoyt. It ignited oil and gasoline in the shop, which was soon consumed.

The cement garage adjoining was also burned, the the stove and a large tank of gasoline were saved. On the other side of the machine shop was a butcher shop with up-to-date fittings and patented ice-cooled ventilated refrigerators. An ice house adjoined the butcher shop, and a saw-sage plant. Next was a building formerly a saloon, but recently used for storing gasoline. As soon as the fire started the autos were rolled out, and as much of the gasoline was saved as possible.

The buildings were all destroyed. The stock in Melhase's store across the street was moved out, and the store building and Melhase house adjoining were hung with wet blankets. The buildings burned all belonged to Mr. Hoyt, tho the machine shop was rented to a man by the name of Calloway. The loss is estimated at \$7,000.

HSUN IS BOXED BY REPUBLICANS

ROYALIST LEADER DRIVEN TO SHELTER IN PEKING TEMPLE. THE END OF THE DYNASTY MOVEMENT BELIEVED NEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 10.—General Chang Hsun, imperial leader in the attempt to restore the Manchu dynasty of China, is reported by Minister Reineck to have withdrawn his troops into the Imperial city and Temple of Heaven, two of the most beautiful sections of Peking.

Loyal republican troops surround the city, and complete destruction of the monarchical government is considered only a matter of a short time.

A dispatch just received says that the republican government has announced confirmation of General Feng Kwo as president. It has been decided to banish the emperor and the imperial family and the monarchist princes from Peking.

Another dispatch says that a republican airplane bombed the imperial palace. Mrs. A. Patterson of the Klamath Agency is in the city on a short visit.
