FLOUR DROPS \$2.50 PER BARREL IN ONE WEEK

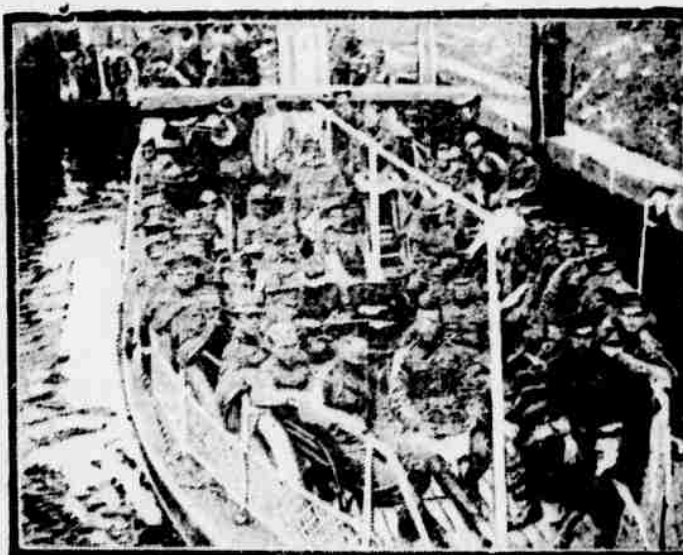

O. A. C. Professor Scores America's Wasteful Methods

PORTLAND, July 10.—"America is the most wasteful of all civilized countries," declared Dean J. A. Bexell of the school of commerce of the Oregon Agricultural College, speaking here on "Waste of Food from the Producer to the Household," at the meeting of the National Council of Education, a branch of the National Education Association.

The most far reaching item of waste is robbing the soil of fertility," Dean Bexell said. "The average return per acre in the United States is \$11.38, the lowest of all civilized countries except Russia. 'Produce more at less cost and consume less' should be the slogan.

'Three remedies for waste are smaller farms, scientific production

MORE BIG FISH FOR UPPER LAKE

SOME "WHOPPERS" WILL SOON ARRIVE FROM LAKE SUPERIOR—HAVE BEEN HATCHED IN BONNEVILLE HATCHERY

The famous Eastern Lake trout, from Lake Superior, are to be introduced to the waters of Upper Klamath Lake, according to announcement made today by Fish Commissioner C. F. Stone.

A carload of these Eastern lake trout will arrive here Sunday evening, July 15th, and most of them will be planted in the Upper Lake. It is

possible that a portion may be taken to the Klamath hatchery on Crooked Creek.

In some respects the Eastern Lake trout are considered better than any of the kinds now inhabiting Oregon lake waters, and are usually much larger than the Rainbow trout of this state hatchery at Bonneville.
