FOREST REGIMENT ENLISTMENT OPEN

PORTLAND, July 11.—District Forester George H. Cecil of Portland announces that the actual enlisting of woodsmen and mill workers for the Tenth Reserve Engineers (Forest) began Monday, July 9th. Enlistment will be for the period of the war. Men wishing to join the regiment should apply to the district forester, Beck building, Portland, or to one of the following, who are assisting in the enlisting work:

Forest Supervisor Seltz, Eugene, Ore.; Forest Supervisor Erickson, Medford, Ore.; Forest Supervisor Hastings, Bend, Ore.; Forest Supervisor Evans, Baker, Ore.; Forest Supervisor Smith, Seattle, Wash.; Forest Supervisor Fromme, Olympia, Wash.; Forest Supervisor Park, Bellingham, Wash.; Forest Supervisor Sylvester, Leavenworth, Wash.

Men recommended by one of these listing officers go to any United States army recruiting officer, where they are accepted as recruits if they pass the physical examination, which is the same as that required for other military service. Recruits must be white, between the ages of 18 and 40 years, and must be citizens of the United States, or have declared their intention to become such. Men subject to conscription will discharge their obligation by enlisting in this regiment. All applicants should understand that this is a military organization; that they must undergo the customary drill and discipline of United States soldiers, and that they may be called upon to do work within the danger zone.

Picked woodsmen will compose the regiment—men who will be given a chance to take the part in the war for which their life and training have fitted them. Although listing has been going on for two weeks, the district forester states that there is still room for experienced loggers and millmen. Places are open for skilled axmen, sawyers, the hewers, skidders, teamsters and blacksmiths. Millwrights, sawyers and engineers are needed to man portable sawmills, which will form part of the equipment; helpers are required for the various activities connected with woods operations and the maintenance of large camps.

HOW WILL OUR BOYS COME BACK?

WILL THE GIRLS ACROSS THE SEA MAKE LIFE PRISONERS OF UNCLE SAM'S SOLDIERS FOLLOWING THE WAR

LIVERPOOL, June 28.—(Correspondence)—Speculating editorially on whether the men of the American army will marry English wives to any appreciable extent, the Liverpool Post says:

"Will American men marry here? We wonder if the coming of the American army will have any effect upon the matrimonial prospects of our girls. For some reason, the men of the new world have hitherto never shown any great eagerness to take brides from the old, and even the theory that this is because it has not been the way of the American man to cross the Atlantic, though it is consoling to our national vanity, does not work. For it is noticeable that the Canadians, who have abounded in our midst during the past three years, are not nearly as fond of marrying into this country as are, for example, Australians.

"Few of the young men from Australia seem to want to return home without English brides, but the Canadians either are married when they come, or show a disposition to remain single.

"Still, there is no need for the girls to despair yet, and if some of them do not spend their lives as matrons in the United States we shall be surprised. Certainly it will not be their fault, as they show a most amiable desire to like any of the American naval and military and medical men they have seen, although in some ways the fellow citizens of President Wilson are so curiously unlike our own men."

Bezdek Continues As Oregon Coach

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 11.—Hugo Bezdek, coach of the champion University of Oregon football eleven, will be back in the fall to handle the team, notwithstanding his recent appointment as manager of the Pittsburgh baseball team in the National League. Announcement to this effect has been made by President Campbell.

Before leaving for the East to confer with the owners of the Pittsburgh club at their suggestion, Coach Bezdek had an interview with President Campbell, in which they discussed the situation, and it was decided that the summer task of coaching the Pirates need not interfere with his man's size winter job of directing the Oregon football eleven.

It is the policy of the University, as announced by President Campbell and the athletic authorities some time ago, to encourage athletics during the war time in line with the sug-

gestion of the Council of National Defense, which in turn was advised along this line by representatives of the allied governments recently in this country. All the Pacific Coast universities, as well as those in other parts of the country, will put teams in the field as usual this fall.

Oregon has, perhaps, been harder hit than any of the universities in the West by the war, since every member of the champion team of 1916 is now in the service of the government, and it will be necessary to build up an entirely new eleven. However, this will give increased opportunity to many players who would have had little chance to make the team against the class of men who would have had little chance to make the team against the class of men who composed the 1916 eleven.

Track athletics and baseball also will be continued by the University of Oregon.

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
