When thinning carrot beds, be careful not to throw away vegetables large as a dime, for this size is the best for canning, says today's bulletin from the National Emergency Food Garden Commission, which is operating with this newspaper in a campaign for food conservation.

Wash carrots thoroughly with a stiff vegetable brush, blanch for four to five minutes, then plunge into cold water for an instant and remove the skin with the stiff brush. The

carrots may be cut into strips or cross sections, or used whole. After packing the jars, add level teaspoonful of salt per quart of vegetables, and fill jars with hot water. Adjust tops and partially tighten them, and sterilize for an hour and a half. (If using tin cans, seal completely before sterilization.) Remove jars from boiling water, tighten tops and invert out of a draught to cool.

For storing, wrap jars in dark paper to prevent bleaching.

## Justice Emphasizes U. S. Franchises to New Citizens

PORTLAND, July 12.—"We cannot expect our new citizens to value their political franchises unless we ourselves appreciate them," said Supreme Justice Wallace McCamant of the Oregon supreme bench, speaking here last night on "The Meaning of Citizenship," at the second citizenship convention of the bureau of naturalization of the United States Department of Labor, held in connection with the National Education Association convention.

Judge McCamant's audience was comprised mainly of aliens, over 200 of whom tonight will take the oath of allegiance as citizens at special exercises held at the Portland auditorium. In his address Judge McCamant reviewed the various rights of American citizens—the right of free speech, free press, religious freedom, the

habeas corpus, trial by jury and others. "These franchises," he said, "make up the most precious political heritage the world has ever known. They may be asserted by any litigant, whether he was naturalized yesterday or whether his ancestors came in colonial times."

"No man is worthy of the franchise of an American citizen unless it is his desire that every other citizen shall possess the same rights he claims for himself. The ceremony of naturalization should be as meaningful as the administration of a sacrament in a church. Ordinarily the privileges of citizenship far outweigh its burdens, but our lot has fallen on times when the burdens are destined to grow heavy. Let us meet them manfully. Let us walk worthy of the political ancestry from which we have sprung."

### German Wealth is Becoming Concentrated

AMSTERDAM, July 12.—The Berlin Tageblatt, in a financial article, calls attention to the increasing danger of German financial power being concentrated in the hands of a few. The growth of "multiple directorships" German bankers, it says, are rapidly accumulating directorships in all concerns in which their banks are

interested. Thus, the number of directorships held by Louis Hagen, a Cologne millionaire, is now 56; Karl Furstenberg of Berlin has 55; Herr von Schwabach has 42; Baron Simon von Oppenheim and two or three others have 40 each, while there is a large group of bankers and industrial leaders who boast of between 30 and 40 each.
