

# Unique Methods of Opportunity School

PORTLAND, July 13.—How the city of Denver provides for education of those who have not the means to obtain a complete education through special schools and colleges, was told to delegates at the citizenship division of the annual convention of the National Education Association here by Miss Emily Griffith, principal of the Opportunity School at Denver.

"Opportunity school was planned for those who must get their education bit by bit, and at odd times," Miss Griffith said. "It was planned for that boy or girl who for some reason does not fit into the regular public school, for the young man who finds after going out into the world that if he is to advance he must have the fundamentals of an education; for the middle-aged man who must know more about his special line of work in order to hold his job and for the old people who all their lives have had a longing to study some special thing, and now find they have the time and opportunity, and for the people from other lands who must know English.

"The classes commence at 8:30 in the morning and close at 9:30 at night. The ages range from 14 years to 70—all nationalities are represented, and it seems all conditions of life. Twenty-three hundred people attended this school last year. Miss Griffith spoke particularly of

the class in citizenship and the cooperation between the school and the United States Naturalization bureau. The school gets 90 per cent of those who register in Denver for citizenship, she said. The applicant spends four evenings a week in the school; studies history, the fundamental laws of the country and duties of citizens.

"He is led to see the relation between labor and capital, thru sane, sensible eyes," Miss Griffith continued. "He knows compulsory education law, the rights of women in America. The present war is studied and the attitude the United States has taken and the responsibility of its citizens at this time."

Students for the school are obtained in many ways, Miss Griffith said. The public library puts a printed slip into every book sent into a foreign family; posters are placed in rooming houses in various languages; ministers in foreign churches and newspapers, all help the school.

"I am satisfied with the results," Miss Griffith said, "because the school is reaching into the lives of these brothers and sisters of ours, and I know that when the school houses are opened that the reader and the history, the lecture and a lot of neighborly kindness and the welfare of a Henry Ford, will cause the articles on 'Problems of the Immigrant' to vanish from our land."
