OREGON IS HIGH ON ENLISTMENTS

STANDS SECOND IN LIST OF 64

RECRUITING STATIONS, AND

REACHES HER FULL QUOTA IN TWO MONTHS

Oregon is one of only three states in the Union to obtain war quotas of army enlistments during April and May. Oregon stands next to the highest in the list of sixty-four recruiting districts in the country for percentage of war quotas obtained.

These two remarkable achievements, indicating Oregon's real co-operative patriotism, are noted in a bulletin received yesterday from Washington by Colonel Young, in charge of the army recruiting station in the Worcester building, Portland.

WAS USED IN DAYS OF ANCIENT

ROME, BUT HAS NEVER BEEN

POPULAR INSTITUTION, ACCORDING TO RECORDS

ALKMAAR, Netherlands, July 14

The bread card, that familiar European product of the present great clash of nations, is nearly 2,000 years old. That is the discovery of a Dutch professor, Doctor M. Molter, who asserts that it was used in Rome under the Emperor Augustus, in whose reign Christ was born.

Moreover, not only did Romans have their bread cards and their government grain, a term that has become so familiar in Holland, but government intervention in ancient Rome evoked as much discontent and friction between public and bread purveyors as has been the case in these modern days.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC, ACCORDING TO THIS STORY

The Southern Pacific company thru Fred A. Ricker, valuation engineer, offers the following striking illustration of what is meant by the 3 per cent grade encountered on its lines over the Siskiyou mountains on the Shasta route:

A passenger on the rear platform of a train of ten cars, each seventy feet long, may look ahead and behold the engineer seated in his cab from twenty to twenty-five feet higher up than the passenger. At the same time, the bottom of the locomotive's driving wheels will be from six to eight feet higher than the top of the last car in which the passenger is seated. This is accomplished by the fact that the passenger and the engineer are over 700 feet apart, and there is a three-foot rise in every 100 feet.
