WOULD KEEP MODOC WOMEN FROM JURIES

SACRAMENTO, July 17 --- The unusual point that women should not be allowed to be members of grand juries was urged here before the last Washington, where there have been Appeals by attorneys for R. E. Lensen, convicted in Modoc county of violating the Wiley local option law.

Lensen was convicted in the superfor court following indictment by a grand jury on which were eight wo men. The contention of the defendant's attorneys is that the case is CHRISTIAN CHURCH BIRLE without precedent, and has no authority in law.

So far as known it is the first time the point has been urged in this state. and the first instance of women on a grand jury. The case was taken under advisement.
