WOULD KEEP MODOC WOMEN FROM JURIES

SACRAMENTO, July 17.—The unusual point that women should not be allowed to be members of grand juries was urged here before the last session of the Third District Court of Appeals by attorneys for R. E. Lensen, convicted in Modoc county of violating the Wiley local option law.

Lensen was convicted in the superior court following indictment by a grand jury on which were eight women. The contention of the defendant's attorneys is that the case is without precedent, and has no authority in law.

So far as known it is the first time the point has been urged in this state, and the first instance of women on a grand jury. The case was taken under advisement.

TRIMENDOUS FOOD SHIPMENT FROM COLORADO THIS YEAR

DENVER, Colo., July 17.—The largest shipments of food in many years, perhaps the largest it has ever handled, are expected to be offered at stations on the Denver & Rio Grande railway this summer and autumn, according to a statement recently filed by that system with the Colorado public utilities commission. The expected shipments total 12,950 carloads.

The estimate of the number of cars of potatoes to be handled from Colorado exceeds the number of carloads of this vegetable handled by the entire system in 1914, the best previous year.

TWELVE MEN ARRESTED LAST NIGHT LEAVE THIS MORNING

No further attempts to destroy the property of the city were reported last night, and it is believed that with the precautions taken to safeguard the community by the citizens' committee, the city will be reasonably safe from future depredations.

Twelve men arriving on the train last evening, whose characters appeared questionable, were taken into custody by Deputy U. S. Marshal John Farnell. They were released this morning, however, on the agreement that they leave the city immediately, which they did.

The bridge at the west end of town is carefully guarded, and no one allowed to pass unless his business is known to be legitimate. The city hall and court house are also carefully watched.

There is a probability that the prisoners, which now number about forty in the city jail, will be given a hearing today, and those who can give a clear account of their actions will be released.

Y. M. C. A. QUARTERS TO BE ERECTED AT 'FRISCO CAMPS

Conservation of the moral forces of California army divisions is an element in the successful warfare that the Y. M. C. A. has undertaken to aid. While the first picks are just being stuck in the ground at Menlo Park to prepare for the camp of the Twentieth National Guard Division, the Y. M. C. A. has begun its work of looking after the soldiers who will be there.

The approval of Major General Hunter Liggett has been given for the program of the national war work council of the Y. M. C. A. proposes. Then Charles G. Titus was appointed general secretary for the Palo Alto camp, and the National Guard armory near the Palo Alto depot was obtained for a camp club house.

I. W. W. TO BE SOON THROTTLED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 17.—German propaganda in the United States, as represented by the I. W. W. will be throttled immediately thru a plan to be put into effect today.

Attorney General Gregory will be requested by congress to assemble at once United States grand juries in every locality where the activities of the I. W. W. have been apparent, place a United States judge in charge, and indict and try all offenders on the spot without loss of time.

The plan contemplates assembling grand juries at East St. Louis, Douglas, Ariz.; Columbus, N. M.; Bisbee, Ariz., and at points in Oregon and Washington, where there have been indications of unwonted activity on the part of the organization's agents. These juries will sit simultaneously, and it is believed that in this way a death blow will be struck at the organization without delay.

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ROYAL FAMILY CHANGES NAME

KING GEORGE WILL FORSAKE THE OLD NAME, WHICH IS OF GERMAN ORIGIN—FAMILY WAS FOUNDED 287 YEARS AGO

LONDON, July 17.—The "House of Windsor" is the new name for the royal house of England announced by King George.

The king belongs to the House of Saxe Coburg-Gotha, which is called from the German province of that name. The province contains 754 miles, and lies on the south side of the forest of Thuringia.

The elder line of the Saxe Coburg house was founded in 1680. The English family recently decided to drop titles of a foreign origin.

MUST RECORD PAWNED GOODS

MEASURE UP WITH COUNCIL PROVIDING FOR RECORDS OF ALL GOODS TAKEN IN SECOND HAND—GOODS HELD 10 DAYS

All pawnbrokers and junk shop keepers of the city must keep a record of goods received, and must not receive goods of persons under 18 years of age, if an ordinance introduced at the city council last night by Councilman Telford is finally passed.

Also goods received from any source must be held ten days before being disposed of. This is to prevent, if possible, the petty thievery that is going on, practiced to a large extent, it is believed, by young boys. It is thought that anyone losing an article will be apt to discover it within ten days, and may locate it thru this precaution.
