MIDLAND MENTION

California Sheriff Must Turn Farmer

MARYSVILLE, Calif., July 18.—Sheriff C. J. McCoy of this county is at a loss to know what to do with a grain crop which he has on his hands, and which is about ready to be harvested. The aforesaid grain crop is located on the lands of the California Orchard and Farm company near Brown's Valley, and is under attachment filed against the company by E. C. Peterson for \$1,085.50.

The growing crop of wheat has

been mentioned in the attachment and the crop is now about ready to be harvested.

McCoy has consulted several attorneys on the matter, and they contend that it is up to him to harvest the crop of wheat. Should there be a loss of the crop resulting from the neglect of McCoy to harvest it, McCoy would be responsible for the loss, and have to make it good, say local attorneys.

War Causes Much Insanity

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 18.—Insane asylums near Washington are rapidly filling, the result of an unprecedented influx of men with inflexible schemes for ending the war immediately. Some of these visitors have gained the private offices of high government officials to divulge their war

remedies, only to suggest something frenzied, as putting soap into the sea to impede the progress of submarines. Other fanatics are dangerous—contemplating the death of some government head as a quick way to end war hostilities. Eighty-four lunatics, all with war ideas, were arrested in June.

Big Loss of German Students

COPENHAGEN, July 18.—Of a total of 42,000 German University students called to the colors up to the conclusion of the last fall and winter semester, 6,000 have been reported as killed, according to advices received here from Berlin.

Berlin University was represented

in Germany's fighting ranks by 5,285 men, of whom 500 are dead. Bonn University supplied 3,647, of whom 364 are killed. The figures for some other universities follow: Heidelberg, 1,650 called up, 250 killed; Munich, 2,255 called up, 10 per cent killed; Leipzig, 3,700 called up, 664 killed.

Berry Pickers Are Needed in Willamette

SALEM, July 18.—Men and women berry pickers are badly needed in the logan berry fields of the Willamette Valley to help pick the berries, according to the growers.

Men say the loganberry crop will be the largest in the valley's history, if it can be picked.

Insults the Flag; Pays the Penalty

WOODLAND, Calif., July 18.—Wilhelm Doering, twice a prisoner of war, pleaded guilty to insulting the American flag and talking treasonably about the United States government.

City Recorder Harrison sentenced him to six months in the county jail

and to pay a fine of \$100. Unable to pay the fine, he will spend an extra hundred days in jail. Doering's insulting remarks were made while he was intoxicated. Papers found on his possession showed that he had been interned and officially released.

German Banks Are Sold in London

LONDON, July 18.—Financial London was greatly interested in the public auction, by order of the trustee, of enemy banks in the heart of the financial district. There was a large attendance of bankers and financiers, and bids came freely for the Deutsche bank (Berlin) for which Messrs. Barclay's bank paid \$1,000,000.

The Dresdner bank buildings were taken by the London City and Midland bank for \$60,000, and the Disconto Gesellschaft premises sold for \$190,000 to the corporation of Lloyds. The freehold and premises of the "George and Vulture" inn, with its memories of Dickens, Swift and John Wilkes, were withdrawn after bids up to \$27,500 had been made.

realized in the medical reserve corps. Lieutenant Colonel Lynch, who spoke at the convention, says the government needs 20,000 physicians at once. Oregon will be expected to supply 250, he added.

Canning Clubs Do Much For Country

SPOKANE, Wash., July 17.—Girls' and boys' canning clubs of Spokane county will can close to 50,000 gallons of foodstuffs if expectations of C. S. Fletcher, assistant county agriculturist are realized. Mr. Fletcher recently estimated that the clubs of boys and girls of this county would make a net profit of \$12,000 this summer.

Mr. Fletcher is arranging to close contracts for the sale of the products of all these clubs to wholesale houses of this city. The canning of peas has already begun, and other varieties of fruits and vegetables will follow. Because of the scarcity and high prices of tin cans, glass jars will be used to a large extent.

NEXT EDITORS' CONVENTION IS SCHEDULED FOR COAST

PENDLETON, July 18.—The 1918 convention of the Oregon State Editorial Society will be held at Shore Acres, Louis Simpson's estate, lying between Marshfield and North Bend, on Coos Bay. Newspaper men of the two cities will unite in entertaining the visitors.

FUTURE CITIZENS TO BE AIDED

SALEM, July 18.—A synopsis of the United States naturalization laws, free from legal terms, has been prepared by Henry R. Hazard, United States naturalization examiner for the 1917-18 Oregon Blue book, which is to be issued soon by Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott. The synopsis is intended to aid aliens in Oregon who desire to become citizens.

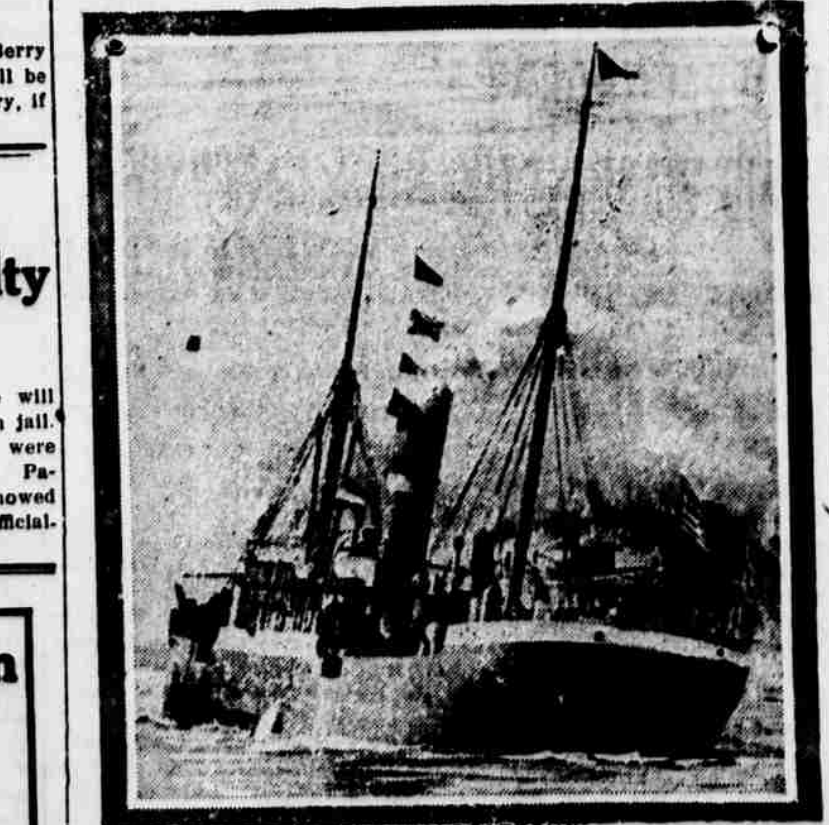
MANY CROSS COLUMBIA BAR
