ONE THIRD OF THOSE WHO STARTED MONDAY GIVE UP TODAY—CONFESSED INCENDIARY CAPTURED

ELLENSBURG, Wash., July 18.—Twenty-one of the sixty-one members who started a hunger strike Monday at the internment camp here, gave up the strike today. Others are still refusing food.

I. W. W. Threatens to Take Law in Their Own Hands

Organizer Makes Traitorous Threat to Governor of Arizona. Sends Message That I. W. W. is Tired of Lawlessness of the Capitalists

GLOBE, Ariz., July 18.—F. M. Little, an organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World, telegraphed Governor Campbell today that the I. W. W. would take the law into its

own hands if any attempt was made to deport from the Globe-Miami district as had been done in the Bisbee section. He said: "The I. W. W. is getting tired of the lawlessness of the capitalist class,

and will no longer stand for the actions of the past." Campbell replied that no deportations could occur with soldiers on guard. He said he would punish Little for his disloyal threats.

U. S. TAKES OVER FRENCH ROAD

FORESTS ARE TURNED OVER TO UNCLE SAM'S TROOPS FOR ROAD TIES AND BARRACKS MATERIAL

PARIS, July 18.—The United States transport service is taking over French railroads from port bases to permanent camp on the front.

Sidings are being enlarged and tracks laid to utilize American locomotives.

Most of the supplies received are imported from America.

In order to provide ties for the roads and lumber for the American barracks, French state forests have been turned over to the American forces.

SEVERE PUNISHMENT FOR GIVING SOLDIERS LIQUOR

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—An intimation is given by United States Commissioner Krull that the federal authorities plan to be particularly severe with persons who sell liquor to soldiers whose duties take them near powder magazines, or stored ammunition.

RED CROSS MAKES LAUGHING GAS FOR USE IN HOSPITALS

PARIS, July 18.—Official announcement is made that all private organizations which desire to give medical aid to American troops must be under Red Cross military control and supervision.

The Red Cross is now constructing the largest nitrous oxide plant in the world. The product, commonly known as laughing gas, will be used as an anesthetic in all American dressing stations and hospitals.
