AUTO REACHED RIM YESTERDAY

FIRST CAR OF SEASON GETS TO RIM OF LAKE BY RUNNING ON PLANKS LAID OVER THE SNOW BANKS

Run on planks placed on the snow in Crater Lake Park, the first automobile of the season reached the hotel on the rim yesterday afternoon, according to telephone report just received. The car was a Buick.

The shovelers are now busy in the remaining drifts, and in less than a week it is believed that cars can run to the rim over dry roads.

Many tourists are now here waiting until the road clear to the lake can be traveled without difficulty, while others appear to have enjoyed making the last mile or so over the snow.

Present indications are that travel this year will surpass anything in previous years.

FOREST PIEL VISITS BEFORE LEAVING FOR THE FRONT

Forest Piel, formerly city editor of the Herald, who has recently enlisted at Eugene, and will leave shortly for France, returned last evening for a fortnight visit with his parents before his departure.

He is a member of the Fourteenth Red Cross Ambulance Corps of the University of Oregon, the captain of which is Dr. J. Eberle Kuykendall, brother of Circuit Judge D. V. Kuykendall of this city. The corps expects to be called to Allentown, Pa., on August 1st, and leave New York for France after five weeks training, September 7th. Fifty-two U. of O. men are in this corps, three from Stanford and eight from the O. A. C. The rest are recruited from over the Northwest.

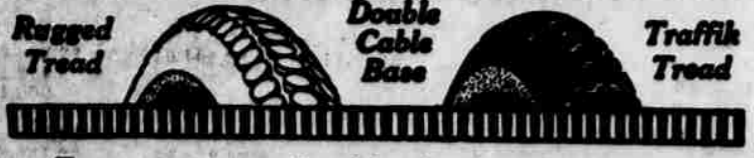
