COPENHAGEN, July 20-The Relschatag yesterday adopted the Peace Resolution by a majority vote of two bundred and fourteen to a bundred and sixteen, seventeen not voting.

Chancellor Michaelia in making his maiden speech to the body declared that Germany would not continue the war a day longer if it could obtain


