Preparations to Protect Property Now Complete

The following statement made for publication today by Charles J. Ferguson, military head of the Defense League, makes it very evident that while little is said, steps are being taken to safeguard the city and county in the present crisis...

Since the public meeting of Monday evening which was held at the Houston's Opera House, the Executive Committee appointed at that time have perfected the organization of the Defense League and from this time on there is no question but what Klamath County is prepared to take care of itself without outside assistance.

Property owners can feel reasonably secure that their property will be protected for the league is prepared at a moment's notice to call 150 armed men into action.

A battalion has been organized and drills will be held as often as possible. Sufficient autos have been pledged to transport this force to any point within the county should trouble arise. These men will be governed by officers who have had military experience and no confusion will occur.

Within a day or two identification cards will be ready to be issued to all strangers within Klamath County who can satisfy the officers of the league that they are entitled to them and those who cannot render a satisfactory account of themselves and their business within the county will be detained until the facts in connection with them have been ascertained.

These cards will be recognized by all patrols and guards, and strangers are advised that they should secure these cards to save themselves inconvenience and annoyance. It is the object and purpose of his league to see that tourists and others who are on legitimate business be free to remain unmolested and enjoy their stay in Klamath County as in ordinary times.

It is also desired to impress upon the people on the outside and at home that there are no labor troubles or strikes in Klamath County; that the honest laborer is wanted and welcome and that there is plenty of work for them in the woods, mills and harvest fields but the labor agitator, the de-

ception of arson, riot and destruction of property will not be tolerated.

Klamath County has profited by its lesson of tolerating the presence of men who preach the doctrine of anarchy and from now on the further they remain from Klamath County the safer they will be.

Branches of the Klamath Falls organization have been organized in Merrill, Ft. Klamath and other outlying communities and there will be complete cooperation so that every part of the county and every property owner within it will be protected.

Sheriff Humphrey who has worked unceasingly and without rest since the outbreak of the war to secure the preservation of law and order. The defense league is working under his orders and under his direction and in conjunction with the city officers and with the state and federal authorities.

It is unfortunate that steps were not taken to organize such a league when it first became evident that the I. W. W. were obtaining a foothold in the county but at that time the trouble to a great many was more fanciful than real, but it is safe to say that at the present time every citizen of the county realizes the character of the men who have come in for the purpose of causing trouble and the objects and purposes of this order, and though Klamath County is as large as some of the eastern States there isn't room enough for the I. W. W. or any of its members.

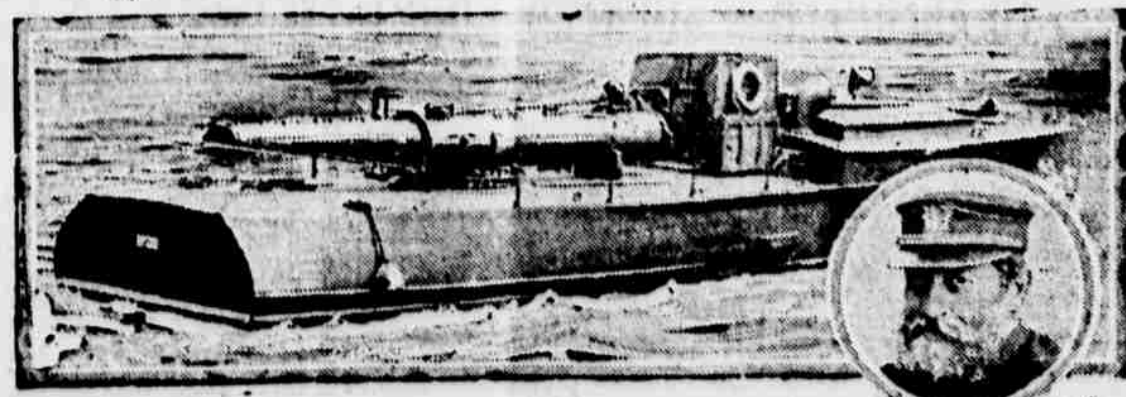
INDIANS GET NEW BRIDGES

THE ENDORSEMENT OF THREE BRIDGES FOR UPPER SPRAGUE RIVER HAS BEEN SECURED FROM WASHINGTON

Hall of Dunsmuir and Dr. Fred Tobbe of Weed. It is estimated there is now in the dumps seventy-five carloads of 650 tons each.
