

California Boys Will Labor on Farms

SACRAMENTO, July 20.—Hundreds of California boys above 16 years of age are soon to be organized for emergency farm labor under direction of Professor H. H. Crocheron of the University of California, who is federal state director of the boys working reserve of the United States. Youths who volunteer for such labor will undergo physical examination to determine their fitness, may be mobilized at the state university farm at Davis for preliminary training, and will be paid fair wages if put to work.

Professor Crocheron has announced thru the state council of defense that the organization of the boys' reserve was made at recent conferences he attended at Washington, at which Secretary of Labor Wilson presided. Herbert Hoover, food director, assisted in the arrangements. Similar organizations of the boys' reserve already been accomplished in a few other states it is said.

County farm advisers will be directors of boys who labor on farms, and they will be enrolled thru the school systems and farm bureaus. The state board of education has announced that 2,158 high school boys and 541 girls already have volunteered to work on farms, and 269 men teachers and 149 women teachers have offered to serve during vacation time as paid supervisors of such labor.

The labor situation in California is not such that school boys as a whole will have to be called out to assist. According to Professor Crocheron it is thought that the need will become more acute as the war goes on, and the plan is to have a boys' reserve ready for such need as may arise. Boy laborers will be sent only to farms where sanitary living conditions have been approved after investigation.

Special Market Service

PORTLAND, July 19.—The receipts at the Portland Union Stockyards Monday were the heaviest since December 4th, 1916. The run of cattle totaled 2,000 head including carload lots, with fewer tail end steers than usual, and a heavier per cent of fairly good cattle. The run of stockers and feeders was smaller and of better quality than the corresponding stock of last week. There were 1,750 hogs and only 150 sheep offered.

Cattle—The conditions at the opening of the market were generally slow, with an inclination on the part of buyers to continue the decline which set in last week. There was a brisk demand for really good beef steers, and the best offered were taken readily at 10 cents. The highest load sale was 9.50 or 35c lower than the best carload sale of the previous week. The general indications are for a 25c cut in price of good beef steers. Common to medium steers are in less demand, and are suffering a depreciation of 50c from last week's open market.

Cows and heifers are going at 50c lower than the opening of last week, and there is a good supply of commons, with only a few loads of really good cows.

Bulls continue steady at a decline of 25c to 35c, and calves continue steady. Quotations were as follows: Receipts, 1,912; tone of market slow, 25c to 50c lower; best beef steers \$9.50 to \$10; good beef steers, \$7.50 to \$9; best beef cows, \$6.50 to \$7.50; ordinary to good cows, \$5 to \$6; best heifers, \$6.50 to \$7.25; bulls, \$5 to \$7; calves, \$9 to \$9.50; stockers and feeder steers, \$6 to \$7; stocker and feeder cows, \$5 to \$6.

Hogs—The hold-over on hogs got a shock when the market opened this week with a heavy supply and a 25c to 40c decrease in prices offered from the close of last week's market. Compared with the opening of last week prices have suffered a little decline, being quoted as follows for this week opening and topping at \$15.65: Receipts, 1,722; tone of market steady at slow, 25c lower; light hogs, \$15.25 to \$14.65; heavy hogs, \$14.25 to \$14.65; pigs, \$13.50 to \$14.

Sheep—The decline in the sheep market was very slight, amounting to probably 25c on lambs and as much on wethers, with no further cuts on ewes. The top for lambs was \$12, but the grade offered was not standard for quotations. The market for the opening quoted as follows: Receipts, 139; tone of market steady to 25c lower; lambs, \$12.25 to \$12.75; yearling wethers, \$9 to \$9.50; ewes, \$3.50 to \$7.

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Cherokee a Canadian Lieutenant in France



Lieutenant Lon Lance, a full blood Cherokee Indian, graduate of Carlisle University, and until the great war a student at West Point, is a first lieutenant in Princess Pat's crack regiment. He has been stationed on the western battle front for over a year, and he took part in the historic engagement of April 9th, on Viny Ridge, and came thru it, the only surviving officer of his rank in the battalion. Several days later "on the quietest day we had in months," as he describes it, he was hit in the back of the head by a piece of shrapnel and thrown violently on his face, breaking his nose. He writes to a friend in America telling of the incident from a base hospital in France. The photo shows Lieutenant Lon Lance in tribal costume, and was made in this country a short time before he enlisted with the Canadian forces.

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
