NEW FEATURES IN BLUE BOOK

ISSUE OF 1918 WILL CONTAIN MANY INNOVATIONS—LARGER NUMBER OWING TO THE INCREASED DEMAND

SALEM, July 23.—Oregon's 1918 Blue Book, soon to be issued, will contain several features never before attempted in the official publication of this state, according to an announcement made here today by Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott, thru Deputy Sam A. Koser.

In the first part of the Blue Book will be found this year the Declaration of Independence, published in the book for the first time. The Constitution of the United States is another feature to be added.

Principal among the other additions is a bit of history which gives the date of the creation of each Oregon county, the name of the county from which it was created and the derivation or origin of every county's name.

Other new features are the list of Oregon ports and the commissioners of each, the text of the act admitting Oregon to statehood, a description of Deschutes county, which was created from the western and southern portions of Crook county at the 1916 general election, a synopsis of the United States naturalization laws, and a table of registered voters by sexes and political parties.

More Blue Books are being printed this year than ever before, on account of the great demand from teachers, students, libraries, newspapers, farmers, merchants and others interested in governmental affairs.

FOREST RECEIPTS SHOW INCREASE

TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT GAIN OVER 1916 IS SHOWN IN FORESTER CECIL'S REPORT, JUST COMPILED

PORTLAND, July 23.—The gross receipts from the national forests of Oregon, Washington and Alaska, comprising the North Pacific District of the forest service, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, were \$644,937.57, according to a report just issued from the office of District Forester George H. Cecil, Portland, Oregon. Refunds due to excess payments for timber or forage were made to the amount of \$8,761.39, leaving the actual receipts for the year \$636,176.18, which is nearly \$150,000 greater than the receipts for the year 1916.

Of this amount, \$450,000 was derived from the sale of national forest timber in the district, and \$186,000 from grazing permits. Special use permits brought in \$11,000. The remainder came from power sites, timber settlement and timber and grazing trespass.

The Whitman national forest in Eastern Oregon leads the district in the amount of receipts from all sources, with a return of \$119,533.20. Of this amount \$107,500 was derived from the sale of timber. The Crater National forest stands second, with a total return of \$95,957.69; \$92,000 of this came from timber sale business. The Tongass national forest in Southeastern Alaska received \$60,442.05.

Other forests in the district which brought in large returns are the Wallawalla, \$46,494.66; the Olympic, \$39,822.28; the Rainier, \$28,012.13; the Columbia, \$25,184.33; the Malheur, \$22,804.24, and the Impqua, \$21,212.74.

In receipts from grazing permits, the Wallawalla national forest leads with \$24,544.57. The Malheur ranks second, with \$21,471.46, and the Fremont forest third, with \$15,137.14. Other forests doing grazing business in excess of \$10,000 for the year are the Wenaha, the Minam, the Ochoco, the Okanogan and the Whitman.

Twenty-five per cent of the total receipts from national forest business will go to the counties in which the forests are located as part of the road and school funds. Ten per cent more will be used in the construction of roads and trails within the national forests. In round numbers, this amounts to \$159,000 and \$63,000 respectively. The states of Oregon and Washington further benefit in the sums of \$127,000 and \$92,000 respectively for forest roads, under the Shackleford act.

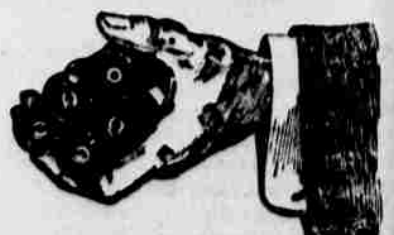
