I. W. W. SUSPECTS BEING EXAMINED

Under a heavy armed guard of deputies, thirty-five alleged I. W. W. members held in the city and county jails here were marched Saturday afternoon to the office of Justice E. W. Gowan and charged with vagrancy by District Attorney W. H. Duncan.

Three plead guilty to the charge and the rest entered a plea of not guilty and will be held for trial.

No sentence has been imposed on those who pleaded guilty. The trial of John Partell and F. L. Armstrong is proceeding today in the Justice Court. One of the men demanded a jury trial and his case was continued for thirty days.

FIVE YEAR OLD CHILD MURDERED

LITTLE GIRL KILLED AS SHE SLEPT IN WASHINGTON TOWN WHILE PARENTS WERE AT CHURCH

WANATCHEE, Wash., July 23—Citizens of Cashmere, twelve miles from here are scouring the country for the man who murdered the five-year old daughter of George Cloud as she slept in bed, while her parents were attending church. Her two brothers sleeping a few feet away were unmolested. The child was struck on the head and the murder later fired a shot into her brain. The motive is unknown.

Fourteen Inch Guns of the Oklahoma and the Target That They Smashed

The fourteen-inch rifles of the Oklahoma, one of the greatest battleships of any navy, are here shown as they fired in target practice recently and tore to bits the object they aimed at. The upper picture shows what was left of the target after the great guns had fired on it. These rifles are believed to be more powerful than any-



thing of any battleship with the exception of those of the Warship and four other new ships of the British navy. At the beginning of the war the best guns in the German navy were of twelve inches, and if any larger have been added since they have not been seen outside the Kiel canal.

DANIEL WAS IN THE LION'S DEN FOR FAIR

SCENERY OF KLAMATH MAY LURE REST OF AMERICA, BUT IT HAS NO FASCINATION FOR POWERS OF PORTLAND

The following story taken from the Evening Telegram goes to show that the spirit of earnestness evidenced by citizens here in treating the I. W. W. problem is appreciated by those who have come in contact with their methods.

"Any of you guys who think you're comin' here to get them I. W. W.'s out of jail are crazy with the heat!" It was the leader of the Klamath Falls vigilante committee speaking.

"You ain't talking to me," replied Attorney Dan E. Powers.

"Well, we just thought we'd let you know," remarked the home guardsman. "We've got forty of 'em in jail, and we're goin' to hang twenty of them and throw the rest in the lake. If you're in here to defend 'em we'll throw you in the lake, too."

Dan got back this morning. He does not advise any local barrister to go down to Klamath Falls to defend the suspects. Up and down the streets roam the citizens, carrying Winchester and navy revolvers. Sawed-off shotguns are also in evidence. They meet the stranger as he comes to town. "What's your business here," they ask.

He has to have pretty good business to get by the sheriff.

Powers was on his way to Sacramento when he received a wire from a Portland client to run over to Klamath Falls and look over some business properties. Dan ran over—he came very nearly running out. He arrived there Tuesday evening; he took the first stage for Ashland the next day.

"They treated me well enough, but—" and Dan said that he was going to Sacramento next week, although he would not go down by way of Klamath Falls.

He declares the people are in dead earnest, and if they ever get hold of the fellows who burned the mill or poisoned any stock it will be "curtains" for them and "no flowers."

"They say that the burning of the mill destroyed their winter's supply of flour," declared the Portland attorney, "and they sure want to get the men who did it, whether it was done by the I. W. W.'s or not. But the citizens grabbed every I. W. W. they could find, whether he was working or looking, and jammed him into jail."

Dan usually talks rapidly, but he began making up for lost time.

"Believe me," he sputtered, "they're goin' to keep 'em in jail until they find out who burned the mill and the dairy barn near town."

He stated that cattle have been poisoned some sixty miles from the town. Last Monday a man was

caught in the act. No questions were asked of him; he will never be able to ask one for himself.

Deputy United States Marshal J. J. Connahan has a force of men there; Sheriff Humphreys has 100 deputies; District Attorney Duncan is busy; the mill company has ten California detectives on the job, and the railroad has a large force of watchmen. But the men of Klamath Falls, young and old, are telling what is to be done.

"Those I. W. W.'s are a lot safer in jail than they'd be on the streets," said the returned attorney. "Duncan and Humphreys and the others are all good fellows, but there isn't going to be any monkeying down there for a while, I'm tellin' ye."

Dan is now having his ticket for Sacramento routed by way of Salt Lake, Denver, El Paso and Los Angeles.

REGISTERED MEN CANNOT ENLIST

FOLLOWING POSTING OF NAMES NO APPLICATION FOR VOLUNTEER SERVICE WILL BE RECEIVED.
