Visitor Says "City Should Build Parks"

VISITOR GIVES WHOLESOME ADVICE TO LOCAL CITIZENS REGARDING DEVELOPMENT OF THE SCENIC RESOURCES

The following letter from an "outsider" calls attention to opportunities that are slipping by.

Some times a suggestion from an "outsider" proves helpful to an "insider," and with this fact in mind I take pleasure in writing you this letter.

I have noticed in my short stay here in your thriving little city, "and you have most assuredly a big city in the making," that there is one very essential thing lacking, and that is your parks.

I have been in every city on your Pacific Coast, and have seen some wonderful creations made from the poorest of materials. The Golden Gate Park of San Francisco, for example, has been developed from sand dunes; the City Park of San Diego from a rough and barren cactus and sage brush canyon to a work of art, whose beauties have been heralded the world over, and here, right in the very heart of "the Switzerland of America" (as has been aptly termed) you have one of the most wonderful opportunities a city ever had, and that is in Link River and Lake Ewauna.

The land along the eastern shore of Link River and west shore of Lake Ewauna should be acquired now by your city while the land is inexpensive. Pave a roadway along your recently abandoned Ankeny canal from Main street to the Upper Lake. Clean up this river and lake shore property, provide some benches and stone fireplaces, such as one finds in all the

big city parks, and you will have laid the foundation for a beautiful park system.

Your motorboating, canoeing and yachting should be developed, and worlds of good, wholesome pleasure and recreation would be derived from this source.

You would then keep at home hundreds of your own citizens that are now compelled to travel thirty to fifty miles for a clean camp ground. This would add a further attraction to your ever increasing tourist travel and trade.

Hoping this letter may be of some benefit to your little city, I am one of your many admirers and a "LOYAL FRIEND."

CALIFORNIA HOLDS RED CROSS EXAMS

SACRAMENTO, July 24.—Anna C. Jamme, director of the state bureau of registration of nurses, announced that an examination for Red Cross nurses for service in France and in hospitals in the United States will be held in San Francisco and Los Angeles on August 22 and 23.

Miss Jamme said that there will be no sentimentality connected with the sending of war nurses to France.

Rigid examinations will be given, she declared, and only the highest types of American women will be selected for duty under the Red Cross. Those desiring to take the examination should file their applications with the bureau of registration of nurses before August 15th.

Los Angeles Rows With the Railroads

LOS ANGELES, July 24.—With the full membership of the board in attendance, the state railroad commission this morning opened its hearing on the union passenger and freight railroad terminal situation, at its offices here.

The commission prefaced the official investigation with several weeks of preliminary examination.

The hearing and investigation involves the plans for building a big union station, both freight and passenger, for all railroads entering Los Angeles and carries with it the matter of the street crossing of these railroads thruout the city. The steam lines are the ones affected.

Several weeks ago the state supreme court gave the commission jurisdiction over railroad crossings both

in cities as well as out of cities.

This jurisdiction had been opposed by the city attorney of Los Angeles, who claimed that while the railroad commission did have complete authority over the question of union terminals in the city of Los Angeles, it did not have control of grade crossings, and that they were solely a matter for the municipality to govern.

RED LIGHT WOMEN

ADOPT NEW RUSE

SACRAMENTO, July 24.—A new and novel method of evading the red-light abatement act has been uncovered at Sherman Island by Clifford Russell, deputy district attorney.

Women of the red light, driven out of Contra Costa County recently, rented two arks on the Sacramento River and moored them off Sherman Island. Here they are visited by men brought from Antioch, according to Russell.

As the arks are located in a navigable stream, under the control of the government, the owners of the boats cannot be prosecuted under the abatement act, nor the property confiscated.

Russell dug up the old statute about disorderly houses, and has notified the women to vacate the arks, giving them until Thursday morning to move.

DISMAL OUTLOOK AHEAD FOR ENEMY

FOOD SUPPLY SHORTER THAN REPORTED AND SITUATION IS GROWING CRITICAL WITH AUSTRIA

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—Quite different in tone from the optimistic feeling expressed by the new German chancellor in his speech to the reichstag are the reports reaching the state department from persons coming out of Germany regarding the food situation and outlook in the central empire.

While this information necessarily is second hand, state department agents are careful to forward only such news as, in their opinion, demand credence.

Standing out in strong relief in the reports is the statement that Germany lacks no less than 600,000 tons of wheat to carry the population thru the middle of August, when the new harvest can be gathered. The harvest, also, is very poor in Eastern Prussia, owing to adverse weather conditions, even potatoes promise only minimum production. Many people are starving in Poland.

Tension between Austria and Germany is declared to have grown so that suspected Austrians are now being interned in Germany.

The centrist leader, Erzberger, is reported to have charged the government with manipulating U boat statistics, to have given warning that the monarchical sentiments of the people are diminishing daily, and to have advised the government never again to threaten German strikers with machine guns, as had been done at the city of Stettin.
