

Directions for Drafted Men Claiming Exemption

PORTLAND, July 24.—Men intending to claim exemption or discharge from the draft by reason of their employment in certain necessary industries, including agriculture, must bear in mind that such claims cannot be made to the local county exemption boards. These local boards are strictly forbidden, under the war department regulations, from considering or even receiving such claims.

Instead, claims for exemption or discharge on industrial grounds must be presented to one of the district boards in the state. In Oregon there are three district boards, one at Portland, one at Eugene and one at La Grande.

Moreover, these claims cannot be presented to the district board until after the man drafted has been called before the local exemption board, has passed his physical examination, and has been certified by the local board as one who has been called for service and not exempted or discharged. It is very important to remember this procedure, if you plan to ask for discharge on industrial grounds. To sum up:

Remember, first, you cannot make such a claim until you have actually been called up for draft.

And second, you cannot make it until the local board has finished with you, has certified you and posted your name as called for service, and not exempted or discharged.

Third, and very important, you must then file your claim, not with the local board, but with the district board of the district in which you are situated. You must file this claim on a blank form you may obtain by application from the local board, within

five days of the certifying and posting of your name by the local board.

File your claim with the one of the following three district boards under whose jurisdiction you are registered: District Board No. 1, at Portland, comprises these counties: Multnomah (outside of Portland), city of Portland, Clatsop, Tillamook, Yamhill, Washington, Marion, Jefferson, Deschutes, Wasco, Hood River, Clackamas and Columbia.

District Board No. 2, at Eugene, comprises these counties: Benton, Coos, Douglas, Josephine, Lincoln, Linn, Lake, Lane, Polk and Klamath. District Board No. 3, at La Grande, comprises these counties: Harney, Malheur, Grant, Baker, Wallowa, Union, Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman, Wheeler and Crook.

Finally, remember the seven penalties provided by law for false statements made for the purpose of seeking exemption or discharge.

PORTLAND, July 24.—Alexander Collet of Echo, a government trapper, is in Portland receiving treatment for rabies at the state board of health. On July 11th, Collet was attacked by a badger while out hunting for coyotes. Before he could kill the animal it had bitten him in the leg.

He was sent to Portland, where Dr. David N. Roberg has started treatment for rabies. The victim failed to preserve the head of the animal for tests for negri bodies to be made, it is taken for granted that it had rabies

SEATTLE WOULD SETTLE STRIKE

FEARED THAT IT WILL EVENTUALLY TIE UP SHIP BUILDING INDUSTRY THERE—FEDERAL OFFICERS ACTIVE

SEATTLE, Wash., July 24.—Under pressure of the federal government, the Seattle business men are continuing their efforts to settle the street car men's strike, and the lumber strikes that closed many lumber and shingle mills in Western Washington.

Federal officers are interested because the street car strike threatens to involve the great Seattle shipbuilding industry, thru a sympathetic strike of all building trades in the ship yards.

FIRE RAGES IN PROSPECT REGION

HEAVY LOSS WILL RESULT FROM FOREST FIRES BETWEEN CRATER LAKE AND MEDFORD—150 MEN FIGHTING THE BLAZE

MEDFORD, July 24.—Forest fires are burning more generally in the Butte Falls, Prospect and Woodruff districts, and partly in Crater Lake National Park than for ten years. The first serious fire in Prospect region started four days ago from lightning. It is believed now under control.

Butte Falls fire is sweeping thru immense timber. One hundred and fifty men are fighting in the territory between Medford and Crater Lake. Three thousand acres are probably burned over, including quite an area of commercial timber.

Fire was within two miles of Prospect on two sides, closing Crater Lake highway to travel. Tourists were marooned on the way back one day and night, but the road is now open. Call for fifty more men indicates increasing danger. The town of Butte Falls is believed to be safe.

State Supervising Warden W. T. Grieve, president of the Jackson county fire patrol association, says inter-laced telephone service in forests, installed by the federal government and local fire patrol association are covering probably 500 miles of line, are the only means of preventing the worst forest fires in the history of Southern Oregon. Fires are located and calls for help given quickly over that circuit. This system, however, is partly burned out, increasing public alarm.

BRIGIANS AT HARD

LABOR IN FRANCE

LONDON, July 24.—Belgian civilians recently deported from the Mons district by order of the German military authorities, have been taken to France, where they are only ten or twelve kilometers from the front, according to a Belgian official. They are chiefly at Ferrain, Arleux, Cantain and other places in the neighborhood of Douai.

The men, of whom the large majority have never done manual labor, are forced to do military work, such as laying railway lines, digging trenches, loading war materials and machinery, and are compelled to work about twelve hours a day and also on night shifts. It is charged that they are cruelly treated, insufficiently fed and badly housed, and that many of them are ill. Among them are some who already had been deported to Germany and then sent back because of ill health.

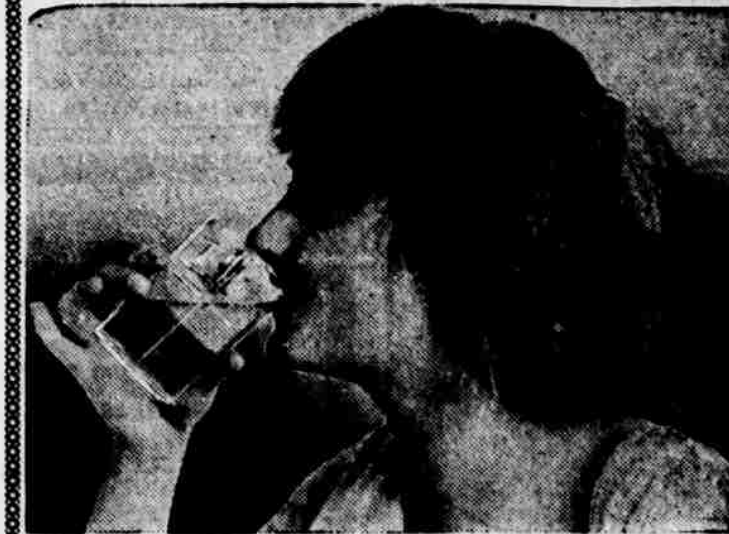

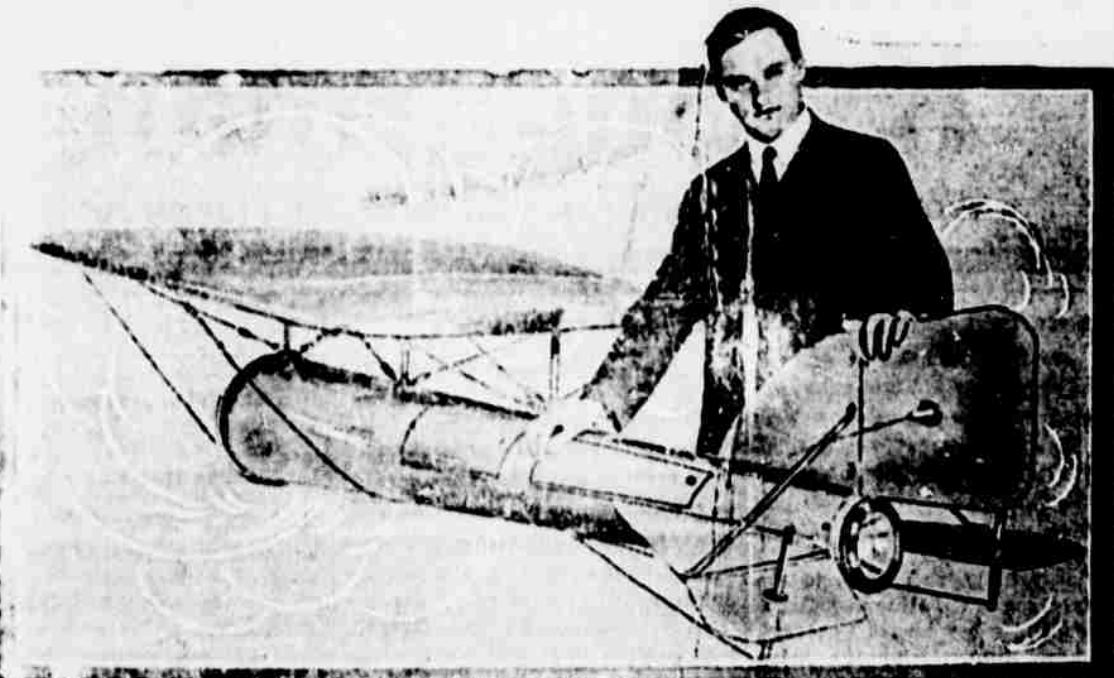
