KLAMATH BOYS
ARE GOING UP

THREE OF OUR BOYS ARE HANGING TOGETHER IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE, AND REFLECT ON THEIR "HOME TOWN"

Many Klamath people will be glad to learn of the promotion to the rank of sergeant of three boys from Klamath Falls. They are Joe Skelton, Everett McCullom and Louis Hoagland. These three lads enlisted in the mechanical branch of the aviation corps, and ever since their enlistment have hung together like the proverbial cockle burs.

When they were ordered to San Antonio, or Fort Sam Houston, they were billeted together, and occupied the same tent. They studied together for the examinations for advancement to the rank of corporal, and were among the twelve out of 150 examined at that time who succeeded in passing the required grade, one of the three making a perfect score.

On the strength of their standing in that examination, all three were transferred to the shops at Dayton, Ohio, and word has just been received that the same success has been met with in the examinations for shop sergeant at that place.

All three have received their sergeant's stripes, and a prouder bunch would be hard to imagine.

These boys have taken the situation seriously from the start, and have taken advantage of every opportunity to forward themselves. The result is seen in their rapid promotion, and the contentment with which they are fulfilling their obligations to Uncle Sam.

GOETHALS AND
DENMAN RESIGN

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—President Wilson has accepted Major General Goethal's resignation as general manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, and asked Chairman Denman to resign.

Denman resigned immediately, and said: "I want to help the president in every possible way."

In asking Denman to resign the president said the resignation of Goethals and Denman was the only way to end the trouble, which delayed the shipbuilding plan.

Washington L. Capps, chief constructor of the navy, is to succeed Goethals and Edward N. Hurley, a Chicago business man, former chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, is to succeed Denman. Brainbridge Colby of New York will succeed Captain John B. White of the shipping board, who also resigned.

Wilson's action comes as a surprise to officials here, who thought he would patch up the differences among the board.
