MIDDLE EUROPE TO BE CREATED

AMSTERDAM, July 27.—A series
of economic conferences between Ger-
man and Austro-Hungarian repre-
sentatives have been inaugurated. These
are the Vienna advices.

The discussions will cover arrange-
ments necessary to be made after the
war. The meeting is considered the
first step toward the creation of the
much-discussed "middle Europe."

The main object of the conferences
at this time, it is indicated, is to find
out what measures Germany and
Austria, with the help of Bulgaria
and Turkey, can take to constitute an
economic union of entente allies de-
cided on in Paris.

**SOUTHERN DISTURBERS
ARE NOW TRACTABLE**

COLUMBUS, N. M., July 27.—The
1,145 Industrial Workers of the
World deported from Bisbee, Ariz.,
several days ago as undesirable cit-
izens, were released from military
guard Monday.

They caused no disorder and made
no attempt to leave, but appointed a
committee of three, B. K. Webb, A.
S. Embres and A. D. Kimball, who
wired President Wilson and Governor
Campbell of Arizona, demanding
transportation to their homes under
protection.

BRUSH FIRE DESTROYS GAME

FOLSOM, July 27.—In the recent
brush fire that raged near Folsom for
two days much wild game was de-
stroyed. Hundreds of jack rabbits,
doves and quail were killed, especial-
ly in the timbered portion burned
over near the state prison.

No hunting has been allowed on
this property in the past few years
and the game has increased vastly in
number.

Men who were fighting the fire
said that even jack rabbits were
burned while running away from the
blaze. The doves and quail were ap-
parently dazed by the fire, and many
were burned while not flying.

**Grant Lands Being
Rapidly Classified**

GRANTS PASS, July 27.—Reports
received here indicate that the work
of classifying the Oregon & Califor-
nia railroad lands in Oregon is pro-
gressing rapidly and will probably
be in readiness for occupancy within
the next few months.
The Roseburg land office will have
jurisdiction over the grant lands in
Lane, Douglas, Curry, Josephine and
Klamath counties. As soon as the
classification work is completed the
lands will be subject to entry under
the general homestead law at \$2.50
per acre, 50 cents per acre being pay-
able at the time of entry and the re-
maining \$2 per acre at the date of
proof.

**Improper Order is
the Cause of Wreck**

BAKER, July 27.—Public Service
Commissioner H. H. Corey, who ar-
rived Tuesday to investigate the
wreck at Pleasant Valley, in which
three were injured Monday morning,
returned to Baker and said that, con-
trary to the original report, the acci-

dent was not due to failure of air-
brakes, but was caused, apparently,
by a mistake in a freight order or an
improper order, the switchman of the
Overland limited not having time to
throw the switch to the siding before
the freight passed.

Timber Fires Near Eugene

EUGENE, July 27.—Several fires
are burning in the timber in the
coast mountains west of Eugene, but
so far no damage is reported, accord-
ing to Carl V. Oglesby, supervising
warden of the Western Lane County
Fire Patrol Association.

One of the fires is near the Noti
tunnel along the line of the Coos
Bay branch of the Southern Pacific
and is burning in green timber, while
another is at the head of Wolf Creek,
southwest of Eugene.

Warden Oglesby says the under-
brush and timber are very dry, and
he fears there will be many more
fires, with resultant damage this sea-
son if there are no heavy rains soon.

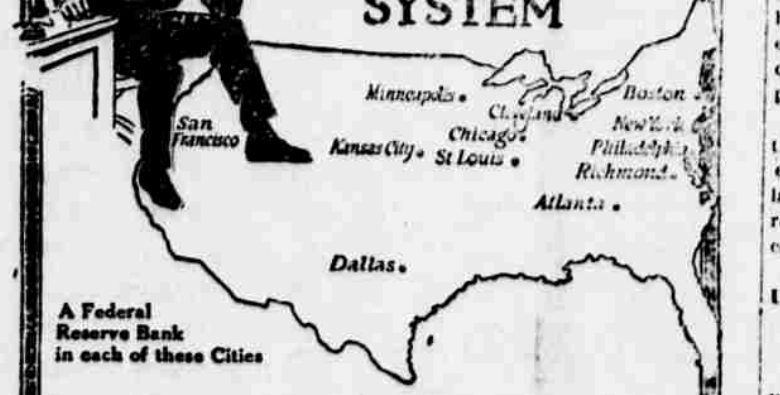

**JOINT STATEMENT FROM
ALLIES ON REICHTAG MOVE**

PARIS, July 27.—The labors of the
allied conference will not be limited
to the Balkans. For one thing, it is
important to clear the air after the
reichstag action last week.

Altho Premier Lloyd George has
already replied to a certain extent to
the speech of Chancellor Michaelis, it
is desirable, says the Matin, that the
allies should issue a joint statement
on what happened at Berlin, so Ger-
many's peace maneuver may every-
where be checked and reasons given
where they are needed why the allies
cannot accept the reichstag resolu-
tion as a basis for peace negotia-
tions.

**DRAFTING RECOMMENDED
FOR HARVESTING CROPS**

BERKELEY, July 27.—Efforts to
find sufficient labor for the farms of
California have proved a failure. The
prospect now is that much of the crop
will go unharvested. Government
conscription of labor may have to be
the means chosen of solving the prob-
lem. These are the conclusions which
have been reached by Professor R. L.
Adams of the University of Califor-
nia.

Professor Adams has been assisting
the state council of defense to aid the
farmers in their difficulties. He de-
clared that with the single exception
of the capable co-operation of Boy
Scouts of Oakland and Berkeley, the
efforts had gone for naught.

CONGRESS MAY ASSIST IRELAND

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—
Resolutions by Representative Ken-
nedy of Rhode Island, proposing that
President Wilson express to Great
Britain for America the hope that
the future government of Ireland be
submitted to a vote of the Irish peo-
ple, and by Representative McLaugh-
lin, Pennsylvania, to direct the state
department to make representations
to Great Britain for establishment of
an Irish government like that of
Canada, were introduced in the
house.

**CORPSE OF TWO HUNDRED
YEARS WILL BE EXAMINED**

STOCKHOLM, July 27.—The sarco-
phagus of Charles XII, Sweden's
"hero king," who was killed by a
shot in the back of the head at the
siege of Frederikshald in 1718, is
shortly to be opened by a commission
of scientists appointed by King Gus-
tavus.

It is desired to make a careful ex-
amination of the nature of the wound,
the direction of entry of the projec-
tile, etc. The coffin was opened in
the wound examined in 1850, but the
examination was carelessly conducted.
