In the drying of fruits and vegetables fresh stock should be used if possible because of the fact that the drying process is not merely a withering of the material, says today's bulletin from the National Emergency Food Garden Commission, which is co-operating with the Herald in its nation wide campaign for saving the food products of the country.

Garden peas should be taken when they are at the right size for table use. They should be shelled as soon as possible after picking, blanched for three to five minutes in boiling water, and then dipped for an instant into cold water. Remove the surface moisture and spread on drying trays in single layers. When cooked, peas dried in this manner resemble the fresh vegetables very closely.

For soups and puree, peas which are too mature for table use may be blanched ten minutes, cold-dipped an instant and dried whole, or after bleaching and cold-dipping they may be passed thru a meat grinder and the pulp spread in thin layers on the

drying screen. When dry, the whole mass may be rolled to a powder or stored in the form of flakes, which break up on cooking.

In the case of the very young and tender sugar peas the whole pod may be used. Wash the fresh material, cut in quarter-inch pieces, blanch for six minutes, cold dip, and spread in thin layers on trays the same as for whole peas.

After drying, the whole material should be conditioned by pouring from one container to another every day for three or four days, so as to have a uniform content of moisture. If too moist, return to drier until cured.

The dried produce should be stored in moisture proof boxes or bags in cool, dry place, free from insects and vermin, and for convenience the containers should be labeled.

Bean Prices This Year About \$6 Per Bushel

O. A. C., Corvallis, July 27.—Bean prices received by the Oregon farmer will probably be around \$6 a bushel, which is the price accepted by the Michigan Bean Growers' Association, as reported in a letter from James N. McBride, the president, to Dr. Hector Macpherson of the O. A. C. department of rural economics.

"The Michigan prices are usually accepted by the California and Colorado associations," says Dr. Macpherson, "and are likely to be the ruling prices throughout the country."

The bean acreage in Michigan is about 50 per cent above normal, but the output will be reduced to the normal by bad weather, bean rot and bean maggot. It is the opinion of bean jobbers, as well as farmers, that the ruling price will be \$6. It is so well settled that it is taken without

much argument, although the United States government is asking whether \$5 is not enough. The universal answer is \$6.

Contracts for delivery as well as figures for September and October all indicate that the crop will be sold quite generally on a \$6 basis.

Oregon acreage was greatly increased in the more food drive, but dry weather is likely to greatly reduce the yield.

Heavy Importations By Russia Reported

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—European Russia imported \$545,853, 000 worth of goods last year, an increase of 100 per cent over the total for 1915, according to a statement issued by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce today. The figures, which do not include munitions, fell short only \$8,000,000 for the normal year.

Great Britain and United States were chief contributors to the Russian market. From 1913 to last year the United States increased her exports to Russia more than 250 per cent, while in the same period Japan registered the remarkable advance of 475 per cent.

The greatest increases were in such war supplies as machinery, boots and shoes, barbed wire, leather, harness, wool, wooden goods and chemicals.

Heavy Guard for Washington Timber

SEATTLE, July 27.—Guards have been sent out by Sheriff John Blinck and a request has been sent to Governor Ernest Lister to detail 100 soldiers to the task of guarding timber in King county, following reports of alleged incendiary activities of members of the I. W. W. A number of men who are suspected of plots to set fire to timber are under arrest in several parts of the state.

Three men who are accused of interfering with the work of government fire fighters near Port Angeles were arrested and are held in the county jail awaiting action by the federal authorities. Three men were arrested near Snoqualmie by King

county officers who allege the men were trespassing near the scene of a fire which broke out about that time.

Numerous forest fires are reported in several sections of the state, and hundreds of men are working to prevent widespread destruction of valuable standing timber. The most serious fires reported are in the Grays Harbor district.
