FIRST U. BOAT BATTLE FOUGHT

AMSTERDAM, July 26—(I. N. E.) Submarine met submarine for the first time in the war. Official reports from Berlin declare that in the encounter a German submarine destroyed the British submarine C-24. The battle, according to accounts received here, was fought on the surface. The location of the action is not given.

The story received here is that the submarines sighted each other from a considerable distance. Instead of submerging each brought his guns into action and a heavy encounter ensued, the water around each boat boiling under the lashing of falling shells.

Owing to the comparative smallness of the targets, there were no hits until after more than 50 shots had been exchanged, when a shell from the U-boat struck the British submarine fairly. The ship plunged downward. The men working the guns were thrown into the sea and before the German ship reached the scene all but one had been lost.

The sole survivor was picked up by the U-boat and is now in a German prison camp.

FOREST FIRE THREATENS ASHLAND'S WATER SUPPLY

ASHLAND, Or., July 27—Word has been received that the forest fire in the vicinity of Humming Bird springs about eight miles west of Ashland, is again beyond control. The force of five fighters under Forest Supervisor Grubbs had the fire under control a time or two last week, but it has broken out now worse than ever. It has burned over 200 acres already, and is rapidly burning down the slopes into the forest reserve and is endangering the city's water supply.

If the fire is not gotten under control very soon, the business houses of Ashland may have to close their doors and fight the flames to protect the city itself, as they did in 1911.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27—Only one-fifth of the 2,600 application for appointment to the Second Reserve Officers Training Camp, at the Presidio, will remain when the culling process, under the supervision of Major Samuel P. Bottoms, has been completed, which will be August 7, according to the schedule.

Four examining boards will act upon the applications. Major Bottoms has named Captain A. T. Easton, W. H. Johnson and G. G. Griggs to aid in this work. The Western Department has been divided into districts to accelerate the work. The date set for issuing notifications as to acceptance and rejection has been set at August 16.

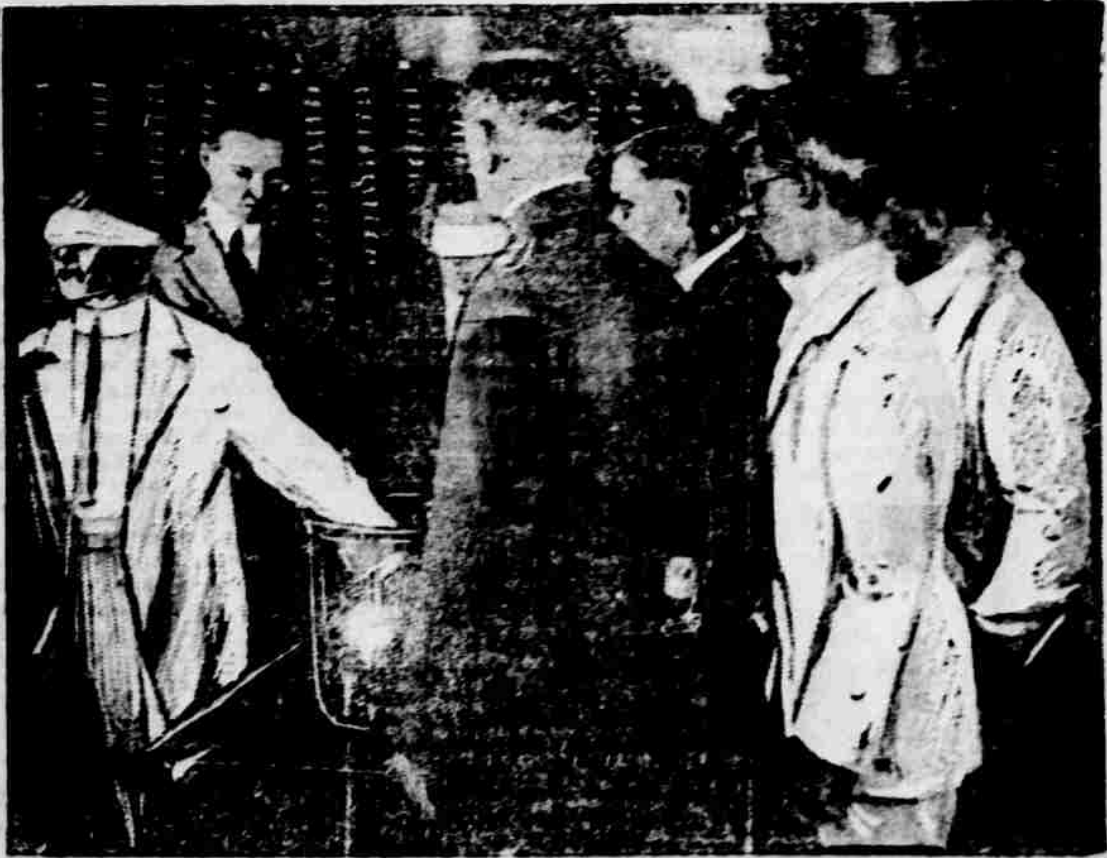

\$2 WHEAT MEANS COSTLY BREAD

WAR EMERGENCY BAKING COUNCIL URGES THAT PRICE OF WHEAT BE LEFT TO FOOD ADMINISTRATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27—In a communication to the Congressional conference on the Food Bill, the War Emergency Council of the baking industry gave notice that the two dollar minimum price for wheat, proposed by the bill will permit of no reduction in the present price of bread.

The council urged that the price of wheat be left to the food administration.
