I. W. W. RETURNED TO PORTLAND

MEDFORD DOES NOT WANT THEM TO PUT OUT FOREST FIRES. OTHERS DEMANDING DOUBLE PAY ARE ALSO RELEASED

MEDFORD, July 28.—Sixty-five men sent here from Portland at the request of S. O. Ostrum, national forest supervisor of this district, to fight fires ranging in the Crater Lake reserve, showed I. W. W. affiliations by distributing leaflets and other propaganda.

Forty of the men were shipped back to Portland Wednesday night. The other twenty were sent to Butte Falls, where the fire was burning, but according to reports from there they refused to work unless double pay was guaranteed them.

This was refused, whereupon the men demanded transportation back to Medford and made threats. Automobiles were ordered from here to bring them back.

LOVELAND WORKS FOR UNCLE SAM

FORMER PORTLAND PASTOR WHO IS WELL KNOWN HERE, SPENDS TWO MONTHS TOURING COUNTRY FOR RECRUITS

PORTLAND, July 28.—Dr. Frank L. Loveland, former pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church in this city, and now stationed in Indianapolis as pastor of the Meridian street Methodist church, is engaged in doing his bit for Uncle Sam. Dr. Loveland is noted as an orator of more than ordinary ability, and this knowledge, coming to the attention of government officials, caused a request to go before the official board of Dr. Loveland's church, asking that he be granted a two months' leave of absence for the purpose of making a speaking tour for recruits.

The request was granted, and Dr. Loveland has been on the lecture platform ever since and, from reports which have leaked thru to the Pacific Coast, has performed a wonderful service, sweeping his audiences with enthusiasm and patriotism, and resulting in the enlistment of hundreds of men in the ranks.

Dr. Frank Loveland is quite well known to many in Klamath County, having spent his vacation hunting and fishing here with a local party last year.

The large audience which was fortunate enough to hear his masterful address given at the opera house on "The World Situation" will not wonder that he was selected by the government for the work he is now doing nor at the success which has accompanied his efforts.

MUST PAY FOR WRAPPING PAPER

CUSTOMERS MAY SOON EXPECT TO PAY EXTRA FOR THE PAPER IN BUNDLES—CHARGE MAY NOW BE LEGALLY MADE

SALEM, July 28.—Retail stores thruout Oregon may soon be charging for the wrapping paper on the packages they sell. Attorney General Brown has ruled recently that if a customer is advised that his purchase is sold by the gross weight, and includes the paper, the sale is perfectly legal under the weights and measures law of the state.

The opinion was asked for particularly in reference to cured meats.

PORTLAND, July 28.—Steam dredges working at harbor entrances and river mouths along the Oregon coast are striving to determine which can remove the largest number of cubic yards of mud and silt from the bottom in a day and month.

Leading the list, according to Portland engineers, is the big dredge Chinook, working at the entrance to the Columbia River, which is credited with having brought up 357,505 cubic yards during June, 1917. Next in the race, according to its officers, is the Clatsop, which moved 347,425 cubic yards while working at Skamokawa in December, 1916. Third on the list is the dredge Colonel P. S. Michie, at Coos Bay, which moved 313,000 cubic yards during June, 1917. The Clatsop claims its record was made in 23 working days.

For daily excavations the Clatsop claims its record of 23,581 cubic yards removed at Walker Island, August 12, 1915, has never been bettered. The Michie officers claim to have moved 19,000 cubic yards in one day.

GRIM PREPARATIONS AT THE OREGON ARMORIES

PORTLAND, July 28.—Oregon's National Guardsmen are mobilized at their home armories thruout the state, awaiting the move to Camp Withycombe and Fort Stevens, and later to Southern training camps. Army officials estimate 2,500 guardsmen obeyed the recent mobilization order in Oregon, and entered federal service.

Almost always these days the men are drilling or working or studying. Visitors to the armories this mobilization time find the men working with a grim, determined sort of air, in striking contrast to the laughter and music that was in order at the armories when the men prepared for service in Mexico last year.

DANGER OF FOREST FIRES IS DECREASED

PORTLAND, July 28.—Danger of forest fires in Oregon, which was considered serious a few days ago on account of the high temperature, has lessened with the lowering of the temperature, according to E. S. Beale, district forecaster.

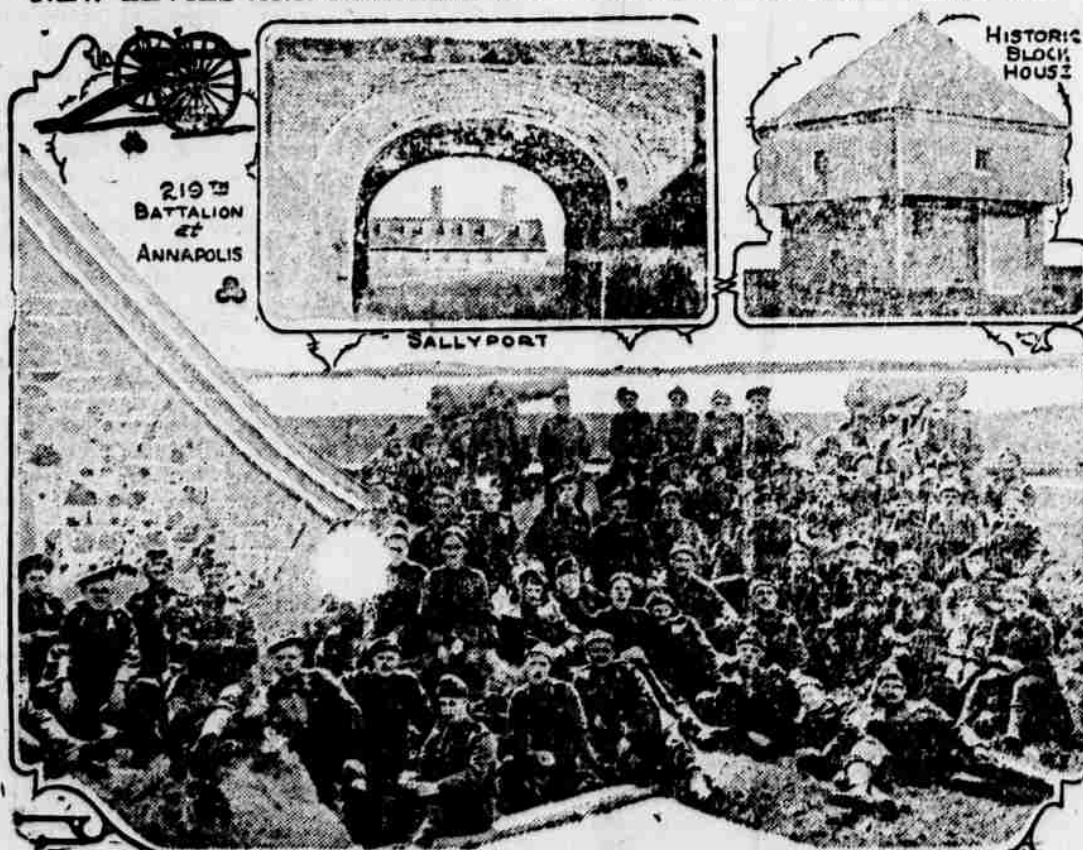
RUSSIANS TO CABLE GRATITUDE TO WILSON
