## Food Preparedness Campaign

If peaches are packed in the jars with the pit cavity down, more fruit can be put in the containers and a finer looking product is obtained, says today's bulletin from the National Emergency Food Garden Commission of Washington, D. C., which is co-operating with this newspaper in its extensive campaign for the saving of the food resources of the country.

Peaches should be washed carefully in cold water, dipped in boiling water for a moment or two until the skin slips, and then into cold water for an instant. The skin is then slipped off, the peaches cut into halves and the pits removed and the halves packed into jars with pit cavity down. A few pits should be placed near the bottom of the jar to give flavor to the fruit. Add medium syrup boiling hot to fill jars, partially tighten tops and sterilize for sixteen minutes in boiling water. After complete sterilization, remove jars from the boiling water, tighten tops and invert to cool in place free from draughts. Wrap in dark paper to prevent loss of color, label and store in cool, dry place.

## Teutons Attempting to Cut Off Russian Food Supply

Petrograd, July 28.—The capture of Tarnopol represents the most early advance of the German forces. It is on the Sereth, eighty miles east of Lemberg. The German advance holds the gravest menace; it threatens the Russian food supply. Careful planning by Hindenburg and Ludendorf is seen in every move so far made. The big outstanding tactics of the situation look to the driving of a wedge between the Ukraine and Western Russia. The Ukraine ("Little Russia," as it is lovingly called by its people) is the fertile granary of the nation. The German advance on the Dniester looks like driving a wedge between these fields of grain and the population of consumers.

## Rules for Exemption of Men Who Are Drafted

PORTLAND, July 30.—To obtain exemption or discharge from the draft will not be quite the simple matter that some persons have thought it.

The government does not desire to draft men who have persons actually dependent upon them, or whose exemption on other grounds is clearly desirable. Neither does it intend that any man who should go shall be excused. Absolute proof, in the form of sworn affidavits and supporting affidavits, of the truth of every claim for exemption will be required.

Exemption will not be regarded as claimed because of any statement made on the registration card. A new claim, supported by affidavits, must be made in each case. Incidentally, no claim for exemption or discharge may be made by any man until he actually has been called up by his county exemption board for physical examination.

For example, a man who expects to be called at some future time cannot make his claim for exemption now. The exemption boards are strictly forbidden to receive or consider claims from men who have not been called up for examination.

For another thing, whether a man files a claim for exemption or not, he positively must appear before the local board for physical examination on the day set in the notification sent him by the board. A man has seven days from the mailing of this notice in which to make application to his board for exemption. He then has ten more days in which to file proofs.

Following are the only grounds for exemption:

- 1—That you are an officer, legislative, executive, or judicial, of the United States, a state or territory or the District of Columbia. And in every case exemption will not be granted unless specifically claimed.
- 2—That you are a regular or duly ordained minister of religion.
- 3—That you were on May 18, 1917, a student preparing for the ministry in any recognized theological or divinity school.
- 4—That you are in the military or naval service of the United States.
- 5—That you are a subject of Germany, whether you have taken out first papers or not. In such case, you will not be accepted for draft, even if you desire to enlist. The regulations on this point are positive.
- 6—That you are a resident alien who has not taken out first papers. Following are the only claims for discharge that can be considered by local exemption boards:
  - 1—That you are an elective county or municipal officer.
  - 2—That you are a customs house clerk.
  - 3—That you are employed by the United States in the transmission of mails.
  - 4—That you are an artificer or workman employed in an armory, arsenal or navy yard of the United States.
  - 5—That you are employed in the

## I. W. W. MIX IN IDAHO JAILBREAK

**NOTED BOOTLEGGER IS FREED, AND ONLY PROMPT ACTION ON PART OF JAILER PREVENTS I. W. W.'S FROM ESCAPING**

WALLACE, Idaho, July 30.—Northern Idaho is aroused by the escape from jail of John Flanigan, known as "King of Bootleggers," who killed another bootlegger.

I. W. W.'s participated in the jail break, and many members of the organization would have escaped but for the prompt action of the jailer. The I. W. W.'s made so much noise by singing and shouting that no one heard the saw being used on a bar of the jail windows.

Another incendiary fire was discovered at Burke in the rear of the Roman Catholic church, where fire was started a few days ago. No damage was done.

An attempt was made at Mullen to destroy the fire hose, but the men were frightened away before much damage was done. Deputy Sheriff William Shannon shot and wounded Al Brown when Brown resisted arrest at Burke. Shannon is alleged to have been attacked in a pool hall by Brown and another man. The men later ran, and when commanded to stop refused. Shannon opened fire and hit Brown.
