Frightened Horses Dash Thru Window

Team Starts Down First Street and Plunges Thru Big Window on Main. No Serious Damage

In their haste to get to the barn for supper Saturday evening the team of horses on the Clinton express wagon refused to wait for the driver on top of the hill at first street and started down full speed. The momentum was so great however that they were unable to make the turn at the bottom of the hill on Main street and plunged nearly thru

the window of the building at the left of the old livery stable there before they could be checked. One of the horses was almost thru the window and the other had its head and front feet inside before they could stop.

No serious damage resulted to either of the animals or wagon and the loss of the window was the only result of the mishap.

Railroad Work Is in Full Swing Now

Declared That Things Begin to Look Like Business Along the Strahorn Route in the Basin

"When one travels over the road from Dairy to Klamath Falls he begins to realize that there is more to this railroad construction business than talk," said Jas. E. Driscoll today, on his return from a trip to the Bly country.

Mr. Driscoll reports that there is evidence of railroad work all along the line. A large crew of men and teams are at work at Pine flat, grubbing and burning sage brush and

grading. At Myers hill another crew are busy blasting the rocks and teams and men are strung all along the line and from the Gap to Klamath Falls doing grading. After leaving the Gap the survey runs practically on a straight line and no curves are being made to escape hills or rocky embankments. At the present state of progress it looks as if the road will be completed to Dairy this fall without question.

COURTPLASTER IS FOUND POISONED

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE AT WASHINGTON WARNS PUBLIC AGAINST PURCHASE OF COURT PLASTER FROM PEDDLERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—Court plaster, said to have been distributed by German sympathizers, has been found by chemical analysis by the department of justice to contain tetanus germs. Attorney General Gregory today warned the public to use only court plaster from reliable sources.

The department of justice has authorized the following statement relative to its investigation of sales of

poisoned plaster in various sections of the United States: "The department of justice without sharing in any sensational view as to the manner in which sticking plaster or courtplaster became infected, states that some of the samples submitted and analyzed have been thereby shown to contain tetanus germs. The public is consequently cautioned against purchasing this remedy except from approved sources. The warning is particularly directed against purchases in small packages from street peddlers and vendors."
