Food Preparedness Campaign

Tomatoes, which are ripe enough for serving raw on the table are just right for canning, says today's bulletin from the National Emergency Food Garden Commission at Washington, D. C., which is co-operating with the Evening Herald in its nation wide food conservation campaign. Use only the firm, well-formed fruit and scald for several minutes to loosen the skin. Dip into cold water for an instant, peel and remove cores with a narrow-bladed, sharp pointed knife, being careful not to cut into the seed lobes more than necessary. Pack carefully and firmly into hot jars and add a level teaspoonful of salt for each quart. No water should be added to tomatoes. Adjust and partially tighten tops of jars, and sterilize in boiling water for twenty-five to thirty minutes. Remove jars from sterilizer and tighten tops at once. Invert jars to test for leakage and let them cool in this position in a place free from draughts. Wrap in dark paper to prevent loss of color, and store in cool, dry place.

Small tomatoes, an inch and a half in diameter, may be washed carefully blanched for ten minutes, cold-dipped and packed with peeling. Jars should be filled with boiling water, a level teaspoonful of salt added to each quart, and the whole sterilized for twenty to thirty minutes. Tomatoes for drying should be prepared in the same way as for canning and then sliced crosswise into half inch slices. These should be spread in layers on the drying trays and dried until leathery. Another way is to sprinkle slices with sugar and dry until the material resembles dried figs.

Dried Berries.—Pick over fruit, removing all leaves, stems and unsound berries, and wash by placing in a colander and pouring cold water thru it. Remove surface moisture by pouring berries on a paper, and then spread in thin layers on drying trays. Cover trays with cheesecloth to exclude all insects and dust, and protect from dew and rain. Stir material occasionally so as to dry evenly and after drying, condition for several days by pouring back and forth from one container to another. Store in tight cans, pasteboard boxes or bags, bearing label of contents. The place of storage should be cool and dry, and free from vermin and insects.

HALF TON BEAR CAPTURED

SANTA FE, N. M., July 31.—A thousand pound bear grizzly bear was lassoed in the Santa Fe National forest by J. F. McMullen, trapper, of the United States biological survey.

The animal was trailed down as she roared thru the woods with a 45-pound trap and a six foot drag hanging to her foot.

U Boat Victims Sprayed With Shrapnel in Water

LONDON, July 31.—Eight men were killed and several wounded by the shelling of a German submarine of the lifeboats of the Elder Dempster steamer Addah, which was torpedoed on June 15th, according to an official version of the affair. One boat was sunk by shrapnel fire from the submarine, and the survivors were sprayed with shrapnel while they were in the water waiting for the other boats to pick them up.

The official narrative says that the submarine commander went alongside one of the Addah's lifeboats and made use of her to send some of the crew of the submarine on board the Addah just before the steamer sank. When the submarine's crew had been returned to their craft the officer in command of the lifeboat was ordered to move away from the submarine.

"By this time," the official statement reads, "the boat commanded by the captain of the Addah, which already was badly damaged by one of the shells from the submarine, was about 300 or 400 yards away from the German craft."

"The submarine again opened fire

on the captain's boat with shrapnel, killing eight men and taking the boat's stern off. Even after the boat had been sunk and the men were swimming in the water, the submarine shelled them with shrapnel. When the German thought he had finished everybody who was in the captain's boat, he then opened fire on the chief officer's boat, firing eight shrapnel. Fortunately nobody was killed, but only holing the boat, breaking the oars and wounding several men slightly.

"After this the submarine commander waved to the chief officer to go over to the position where the captain and several other people were swimming about to pick them up, and the submarine then went away on the surface.

"The captain and the remainder of the men were then picked up and taken aboard the chief officer's boat, and were eventually picked up by a French patrol steamer.

"This," the statement adds, "is a fine and gallant record for seamen of the nation that claims to be fighting for the freedom of the seas."

New Method Employed For Light & Water Rates

While as before intimated, there will be no radical changes made in the rates for the light and water users of this city in the new schedule ordered by the public service commission of Oregon, to go into effect September 1st, there will be certain adjustments made, and the entire system for computing the cost to the consumer is to be rearranged.

In the first place, there are to be no more flat rates, and all consumers will be placed on meters, the commission holding that the flat rate system is an unfair one, inasmuch as the persons who are reasonably careful of using the lights are paying for those who are careless.

The flat rate will, however, be continued temporarily for electric heating for those who have already installed apparatus for this purpose. Electric heating is held to be impracticable by the commission, and will be discontinued entirely after a period of two years, when it is held that present customers for this power will have been in a large measure repaid for the installation charges.

The minimum rate for residence lighting is now 90 cents, as compared to \$1 under the former schedule.

In the commercial lighting schedule there are two rates known as the primary and secondary rates. In these, the principal that a heavy load made upon the power at one time is more difficult for the company to furnish than a smaller load strung out over a long period, is followed by making the cost of 100 lights together for one hour more expensive than one light for 100 hours.

Following is a portion of the new schedule, which will be continued in installments.

Residence Lighting

First 7 kilowatt hours or less, per month, 90 cents.
Next 43 kilowatt hours, each 10c.
Excess, 7c.
Such residence customers as will probably not exceed the minimum charge may, at the option of the com-

mission, be billed at such charge without the installation of a meter.

Commercial Lighting

First 50 hours used per month of the customer's active load will be at the primary rate.

All additional use will be at the secondary rate.
Primary rate: First 8 kilowatt hours or less, \$1.
Next 92 kilowatt hours, each 10c.
Excess, 7c.

Secondary rate: First 150 kilowatt hours, each 7c.
Next 250 kilowatt hours, each, 5c.
Next 400 kilowatt hours, each, 3c.
Next 700 kilowatt hours, each, 2c.
Excess, 1 1/2c.

Minimum charge: No monthly bill shall be less than \$1, plus 10c for each 100 watts, or major fraction thereof, of active load in excess of 500 watts.

Active load: No active load will be considered as less than 500 watts. The active load of all commercial lighting installations will be determined as follows:
One-third of the connected load in: Apartment houses and hotels (except reception rooms, hallways and lobbies).
Warehouses and barns (except offices and workrooms).
Academy and schools (except night schools).

Of all other lights and exceptions noted above—
80 per cent of the first two kilowatts of connected load.
50 per cent of all excess, over two kilowatts of connected load.

Lighting—Out of Town
This rate applies to rural customers where there are less than 15 connections per mile of line, as measured from the city limits or from the point of origin of the line if from out-door substation.

First 10 kilowatt hours or less, per month, \$1.30.
Next 40 kilowatt hours, each, 5c.
Excess, 5c.

BELIEVED THAT KITCHENER

STILL LIVES, A PRISONER

LONDON, July 31.—The statement by Mrs. Parker, sister of Lord Kitchener, that she believes her brother to be alive and that he did not go down with the cruiser Hampshire, has revived a rumor which has recurred in England during the year past. Asked by an interviewer on what grounds she based her belief, Mrs. Parker replied:

"I cannot tell you on what grounds I believe it. In fact, I do not want to go into any details whatever."

The original rumor was that a letter had been received from a British prisoner in Germany saying that Lord Kitchener was a prisoner there. The letter was never traced, and the rumor was considered a canard.

AMERICANS LEFT IN WATER

WITH SHIP SUBMERGED

LONDON, July 31.—The crew of the American bark Camelia, which was recently sunk by a German submarine, were left to their fate struggling in the water, according to information brought to port by the bark's sailors.

They said they were lined up on the deck of the U boat and compelled to watch the Germans sink their ship. In the meantime a British destroyer was seen approaching, and the submarine submerged, leaving the sailors in the water. The Americans were all picked up.

SACRAMENTO WANTS

AEROPLANE BANK

SACRAMENTO, July 31.—A survey of the facilities of every industry in Sacramento that can possibly contribute toward the establishment and operation of an aeroplane factory in this city will be made by a committee named by the home products and manufacturing bureau of the consolidated chamber of commerce. A. N. Bullock has been placed at the head of the committee.

This step is taken to comply with the request of the federal government looking to the establishing of such an industry in Sacramento.

It is thought that all facilities needed for building aeroplanes are available in Sacramento, and telegrams have been sent to Washington in an effort to secure the factory.

DANGEROUS FIRE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

NELSON, B. C., July 31.—Fifty men are reported to have been trapped in a disastrous forest fire which swept over the Elk Lumber company's plant at Spruce Creek, twelve miles east of here.

Last reports reaching here said that four bodies had been recovered and that the fire was still burning fiercely. Damage to the lumber plant was placed at nearly \$75,000, but no estimate could be made of the timber loss.

EMMA GOLDMAN OUT ON BAIL

NEW YORK, July 31.—Emma Goldman, the anarchist, convicted of conspiracy to obstruct the selective draft law, brought here from the federal prison at Jefferson City, Mo., for hearing on an appeal from the sentence, was today released on \$25,000 bail.
