

Two Air Raids Made On Paris

PARIS, July 31.—The censor permits the publication of scanty details of an air raid made on Paris Friday night, which the Associated Press was not allowed to send before, and which the French newspapers were not permitted to publish. According to this information, bombs were dropped on three different suburban sections.

In the first the bombardment caused absolutely no damage; in the other two localities five or six bombs were dropped, causing the slight injury of two women. One bomb of several that fell in a field is believed to have contained asphyxiating gas. The attempted raid on Paris Saturday night was even more unsuccessful than that on Friday, for the German aviators were not able to reach Paris at all. Their coming was anticipated, and French protecting airplanes were circling around Paris from early evening. The residents, however, did not look for a renewal of the fruitless attack of the previous night, and most of them had retired when the sirens gave the warning. Crowds rushed to the streets, roofs and windows, instead of seeking shelter, but they saw nothing. Less than an hour after the first warning reassuring bugles announced that the enemy aviators had been turned back.

Northern California Fires Under Control

UKIAH, Calif., July 31.—Serious forest fires, which have been burning in Mendocino County, are practically under control, although reports from returning fire fighters are that the danger has not yet passed.

Late yesterday practically the entire Ukiah Valley was surrounded by fires burning in the timber and undergrowth of the slopes, while calls for men to fight fires were sent in from other parts of the county. Ukiah itself is in no immediate danger.

Reports now are that the fire near Orr's Springs, which threatened serious damage, has been practically controlled, but fires burning toward the same point from other directions are causing alarm. Fire Warden Joe Weselak, with a crew of volunteers from Ukiah, is in charge of the fire fighting.

Reports from the Carmichael ranch said that a fire there had destroyed 1,000 acres of pasture, and had burned over a six mile front in the timber. Another fire is burning toward Orr's Springs from Imulco, and telephone reports from Anderson Valley told of fires doing considerable damage there. Still another fire was reported as having started in Potter Valley.

Spud Crop May Fall Short of Big Estimate

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Warning that this year's potato crop might not reach the 452,000,000 bushels record production forecast for it because of poor seed and scanty fertilizing, was issued by Lou D. Sweet, the Colorado potato expert, commander by the food administration.

Municipal storage in cities and towns are urged by Sweet to enable producers to sell at a figure just to themselves and to enable the buyer, particularly the poor buyer, to buy as he needs "without paying tribute to speculators or middlemen, who control a certain amount of storage space."

SAILING VESSELS

INSURANCE INCREASED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—War insurance rates on all vessels sailing to and from ports in the United States, European ports and those in the Mediterranean will be increased from 6 per cent to 6½ per cent, the treasury department has announced.

BAKER POWER PLANT BURNS

EASTERN OREGON LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY, DAMAGED BY FLOODS LAST MONTH, TOTALLY DESTROYED BY FIRE

BAKER, July 31.—A brief telephone message received here was to the effect that the power plant of the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company was practically a total loss by fire, entailing a loss estimated at from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Just after the plant superintendent had stated that the plant was burning telephone communication was suddenly terminated, the line probably going out of commission as a result of the fire.

Communication was later established with Granite, a few miles from the plant, information coming from there that men had gone to help fight the blaze. Details were not given.

General Manager Harmon and other company officials left here by automobile at 6 o'clock for the plant.

The company has had much misfortune lately; early last month the Rock Creek plant was damaged by a flood when a section of the Klamath lake reservoir dam went out, washing out over 500 feet of flume and otherwise damaging the plant, which was just put back in commission Friday, after being idle since that time.

The loss of the Olive Lake plant will put two dredges and a number of mines in the Sumpter district out of business indefinitely, as all are supplied with power from there.

Baker and other towns will have to be carried by the Rock Creek plant and the emergency steam plant here, which will not be ready for operation for some days, undergoing repairs which were started when the Rock Creek plant was commissioned again. Power and light service here will probably be somewhat impaired in the meantime.

GERMANS TAKE WIRE FROM FARMS TO TRENCHES

AMSTERDAM, July 31.—The Germans are requisitioning wire, and particularly barbed wire, all over Belgium, according to the latest news from the frontier.

The retention of only one wire is allowed, to mark off the division of the fields. They are likewise breaking up more and more tracks and light railroads, carrying off the rails and sleepers, as well as cars and locomotives.

WILL REFOREST UNITED KINGDOM

LONDON, July 31.—It is planned to spend between five and six million pounds sterling within the next ten years for reforestation in the United Kingdom.

The reconstruction committee has an elaborate plan in hand for replanting, especially in Ireland, where the areas have been denuded for timber for pit props.

Oregon School Children Given Practical Work

SALEM, July 31.—To enable Oregon school children to obtain intimate knowledge of the state's agricultural and manufacturing resources by dealing with the same facts and figures handled by Oregon business men and growers, Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill is planning to give the students actual problems in arithmetic concerning farming questions, deals in fruit, timber, grain and other products.

Letters have been sent to secretaries of commercial organizations throughout the state, Superintendent Churchill announced here today, asking them to send to the department of education problems based on actual figures. Problems are wanted from every county in the state.

"For agricultural products the problems should be based upon the yield per acre, price per pound, using always the accepted market unit," the letter reads. "For dairy products the problems should bring out the yield per cow, the number of acres required to keep one cow, and the fruit problems should show the different fruits raised in Oregon."

"At present there is no way of teaching in our public schools the agricultural and manufacturing resources of various sections of Oregon except by memorizing what is taught in our geographies, supplemented by commercial club pamphlets," the letter continued. "The difficulty with this plan is that too much memory work is required, and many of the
