

The Treatment of Diseases By the X-Ray

In many cases, tubercular lesions in the lungs can be seen by the X-Ray before the disease is discovered by other tests, allowing the patient to be placed under treatment sooner, thereby making the recovery more possible.

Due to the rapid advancement of science, doctors have at their com-

mand many new methods for diagnosis and treatment. When a patient is going to have an operation, say, for instance, for gall stones, an X-Ray picture is taken to ascertain whether or not the gall stones are present, thereby making a diagnosis of the case certain.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Klamath.

In the Matter of the Organization of Pine Grove Irrigation District.
Whereas, under the provisions of chapter 357, General Laws of Oregon for 1917, said County Court, on the 3d day of August, 1917, made and entered an order designating and establishing Pine Grove Irrigation District, with the following boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest corner of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4, section 7, township 39 south, range 10, E. W. M.; thence due east to the northeast corner of NE 1/4 of NW 1/4, section 8, same township and range; thence south to center of said section 8; thence east to northeast corner of NW 1/4 of SE 1/4, same section; thence south to center of the SE 1/4 of said section 8; thence east to northeast corner of SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of section 9, said township and range; thence south to southeast corner of SW 1/4 of section 9; thence east to the northeast corner of NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4, section 16, said township and range; thence south to a point intersecting the right of way of the United States Reclamation Service Main and East Branch Canal at the southeast corner of the SW 1/4 of the SE 1/4, in said section 16, same township and range; thence along the northerly limit of said right

of way, in a westerly direction to a point where said right of way intersects the section line between sections 17 and 20, in said township and range; thence west to the southwest corner of the SW 1/4 of said section 17; thence north to the southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4, said section 17, same township and range; thence east to the southwest corner of NE 1/4 of NE 1/4, section 18, said township and range; thence north to place of beginning; all in Klamath County, Oregon.

Now, therefore, for the purpose of determining whether or not such district shall be organized under the provisions of said act, an election will be held at Pine Grove school house, in said district, in said county and state, on the 4th day of September, 1917, which election will be held at eight o'clock in the morning, and will continue until seven in the evening of said day, at which the qualified electors therein shall cast ballots which shall contain these words: IRRIGATION DISTRICT—YES IRRIGATION DISTRICT—NO Or words equivalent thereto.

There shall also be elected at such time and place three directors for said district, whose term of office shall expire in one, two and three years, respectively, from the first Tuesday in February, next succeeding their election. The nominations of candidates for said offices may be made by petition, signed by at least ten of the electors in said proposed district, qualified to vote for the officers so nominated, or at an assembly of not less than twenty-five of said electors, which said nominations, by petition or by assembly, shall be filed with the undersigned at least ten days next preceding the date of said election.

Uncle Sam's Tars Don't Miss Booze

BASE AMERICAN FLOTILLA IN BRITISH WATERS, July 26—(Correspondence)—Black coffee is the popular drink with the men over here in Uncle Sam's teetotal navy. Steaming hot coffee is always on tap on board the destroyers when they are out looking for submarines. The men say it not only keeps them awake, but serves also as a stimulant and protector against the rigorous climatic conditions under which they labor. They have not yet carried on board ship the afternoon tea habit which they have formed ashore and found such a satisfactory substitute

for the use of alcoholic drinks.

The vast majority of the men say they do not miss the absence of intoxicating drink on board their ships. Those who want it can get it ashore from midday until 8 o'clock in the evening, but for the vast majority the liquor saloons have very little charm. The record of the men as a whole in this respect, say their officers, has been one of the gratifying features of their stay here.

The patrols, therefore, have very little to do but walk up and down the main street of the village in search of the trouble that seldom comes.

TO COMMANDEER ALL MERCHANTMEN

SHIPPING BOARD PLANS TO SECURE AMERICAN TONNAGE UNDER THE ACT RECENTLY PASSED BY CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—The shipping board is soon to announce a plan for the commandeering for the operation of all American ocean going merchantmen under the recent congressional act authorizing the president to commandeer tonnage for government use.

This program is preliminary to getting joint control of the world's shipping for England. America hopes to get more ships in the Atlantic service.

SEATTLE MEET IS POSTPONED

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 3.—The annual convention of sheriffs of the state of Washington, which was to have been held in Spokane August 3, 3 and 4, has been indefinitely postponed.

According to D. E. Nickelson of Walla Walla, the postponement was decided upon because of the urgent need of all sheriffs in their counties at the present time. Industrial Workers of the World activities are said to have considerable to do with the postponement of the gathering.

MEXICO WOULD STOP EXPORTING NECESSITIES

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 3.—The National Commercial Congress, which convened in Mexico City about the middle of July, recommended to the national congress that the exportation from Mexico of articles of prime necessity be prohibited. The list as outlined in the resolution would include corn, wheat, flour, beans and cotton.

CENSORSHIP STARTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—The first report of the new censorship regulations promulgated by the committee on public information was to deny newspapers publication of news stories announced without restriction in official quarters.

State department officials gave out some detail of the Belgian mission's forthcoming visit to Boston. The Russian embassy announced some detail of its forthcoming visit to Chicago. At the department of commerce it was stated that certain ships had been transferred to the navy for coast patrol.

All three items were referred to the committee on public information for view, and publication was denied.

Later the committee learned that Secretary Redfield himself had announced the transfer of ships to the navy, and thereupon withdrew its request for suppression. The ships are the Isis, Bache and Surveyor, formerly of the coast and geodetic survey.

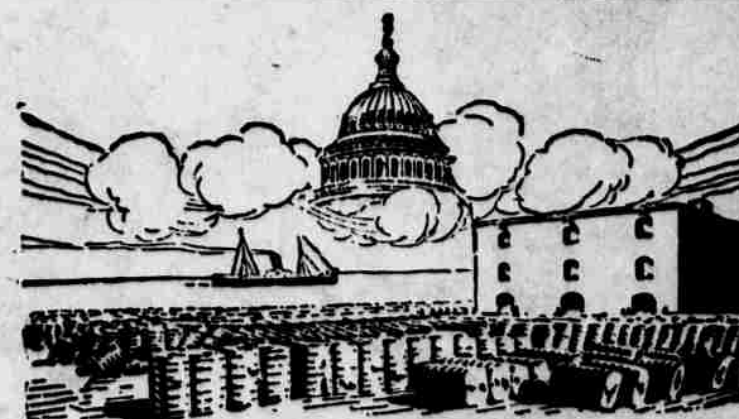
