AT FRESNO, CAL.

THE I. W. W. LEADER WHO WAS
LYNCHED AT BUTTE WILL BE
BURIED AT OLD HOME WITH
PROTEST DEMONSTRATION

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Secretary Haywood of the Industrial Workers of the World, has received a telegram stating that the funeral of Frank Little, the member of the executive committee who was hanged at Butte, Mont., will take place at his old home at Fresno, Calif.

The message said the funeral would be marked by a demonstration of protest by the I. W. W.

Little was one of the agitators prominent in the trouble recently in Arizona. He is reported to have started trouble of a like nature in Montana, and was taken from his room by six masked men and hanged along the railroad on the outskirts of the city.

When the sheriff recovered the body he found a note pinned to his underclothing bearing the words: "Fred Crayon and others take notice. First and last warning, 3-7-77."

The figures were those of the old Montana Vigilantes which were sent to marked men.

United States District Attorney Wheeler said that the lynching was the most unwise thing that could have happened here. County Attorney Jackson said the lynchings would be prisoners if caught. I. W. W. leaders say they know five of the lynchings.

VIRGINIA, Minn., Aug. 3.—At a secret meeting of the Metal Mine Workers branch of the Industrial Workers of the World, great indignation was expressed over the lynching of Frank Little, the I. W. W. agitator at Butte.

TRAINING CAMPS
