# Outbreak of Traitors In Iowa Communities

## Citizens Are Arrested for Treasonable Utterances. Informer Threat- ened With Lynching. Men in Custody

**CEDAR RAPIDS, Aug. 4.**—An out-  
 break which resulted from the arrest  
 of the Rev. John Reichert, pastor of  
 the German Evangelical church at  
 Lowden, Iowa, on a charge of mak-  
 ing treasonable utterances, is being  
 investigated by United States mar-  
 shals. A mob is reported to have  
 threatened to lynch Dan McGilvray,  
 an attorney, who gave the informa-  
 tion which led to the Rev. Reichert's  
 arrest.

**LOWDEN, Iowa, Aug. 4.**—Four citi-  
 zens of this community, three of  
 them past 60 years of age, were ar-  
 rested by federal officers and charged  
 with treason and resisting the govern-  
 ment. The action is an aftermath of  
 an outbreak that approached a riot  
 between loyal citizens and pro-Ger-  
 mans. The prisoners are:

Albert Schaefer, retired farmer;  
 William Richman, furniture dealer;  
 Ernest Meier, retired farmer, and  
 Carl Gerht, farmer. All are wealthy  
 men.

United States Marshal Moore and  
 Deputy Healey arrived here from  
 Cedar Rapids after they had been in-  
 formed that this town of 700 popula-  
 tion was a hotbed of sedition. Rich-  
 man has a son who enlisted in the  
 army, and he is reported to have said  
 he would rather see the boy dead

 Aug. 4.—Louis Pindy, the man who  
 set fire to the Hotel de Ville in May,  
 1871, and who was one of the last  
 four members of the Paris Commune  
 exiled in Switzerland, has just died  
 at the age of 77. The remaining three  
 are Protot, who was minister of Jus-  
 tice in the government of the Com-  
 mune, with Loucas and Gerardon,  
 two inconspicuous members of the  
 commune.

Posses have started from here to
