NEW ROAD TO SHIPPINGTON IS NOW COMPLETED

LONGEST STRETCH OF CITY PAVEMENT OPEN

The Shippington road is completed. The oil macadam highway voted by the citizens of Klamath Falls last year to furnish a connection to the business part of the city and the industries on the Upper Klamath Lake at a cost of \$20,000, was finished Saturday evening.

Contractor J. H. Garrett declares that this is the best piece of oil macadam road in Klamath County, and that it will stand up under the traffic which will go over it.

In order to make the new road more permanent, a fill 750 feet long was built across the low ground just this side of the Klamath Manufacturing company. This fill is an average of fourteen inches deep, and is constructed of good dirt and rock to replace the swampy soil of that section.

Difficulty in obtaining materials prevented the completing of the road at an earlier date.

It is reported that J. H. Hamilton will construct a short oil macadam improvement from the new road to connect with his boat landing.

RUSS CABINET NOW COMPLETED

KERENSKY TO HAVE ADDED DUTIES—MINISTER OF INTERIOR RECENTLY RELEASED FROM PENITENTIARY

PETROGRAD, Aug. 6.—The cabinet of Premier Kerensky is now practically complete. The constitutional democrats have agreed to Kerensky's appointment as premier and minister of war.

M. I. Terestchenko is to be minister of foreign affairs, and M. Akseutloff, a social revolutionary, recently released from the penitentiary, is to be minister of the interior.

RESISTERS ARE HELD TRAITORS

WILL BE CHARGED WITH TREASON AND DEATH PENALTY ASKED BY GOVERNMENT—TROUBLE SOON OVER, PREDICTED

MUSKOGEE, Aug. 6.—United States District Attorney McGinnis has announced that the men arrested on charges of resisting the draft law in connection with the Oklahoma uprising will be tried for treason.

The government will ask for the death penalty. Two deputies have been sent to the infested districts of the state to gather evidence against the alleged resisters.

The second week of guerilla warfare begun with predictions that the uprising was doomed. One resister was killed last night.

Several of the leaders have been captured.

The alleged traitors consists of armed bands of tenant farmers, half-breed Indians and negroes, who are running rampant thru five counties in East Central Oklahoma.

FOOD CONTROL STILL IN AIR

BITTER FIGHT NOW ON IN SENATE—HERBERT HOOVER IS ATTACKED BY REED OF MISSOURI—THRU WEDNESDAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 6.—The consideration of the conference report on the administration food control bill has been resumed in the senate, with a bitter fight ahead.

Senator Reed of Missouri began with another attack on Herbert Hoover. He also attacked the men Hoover had selected to assist him in the food administration, and said that the appointment of thirteen agents to take charge of the thirteen terminal grain markets was made without authority of law.

The administration hopes to put the bill thru by Wednesday.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7.—The state finance committee favorably reported upon the war tax bill as finally revised. To meet the latest estimates it is proposed to raise \$2,000,970 by taxation.

CROWDS VISIT CRATER LAKE

WILL BE BIGGEST YEAR IN HISTORY OF LAKE—FIFTY CARS FROM HERE SUNDAY—TAME DEER ARE SEEN IN PARK

A total of 2,763 people visited Crater Lake Park during the month of July, according to the official records just received, and this in spite of the fact that the lake was not accessible to the public until very late in the month.

This report indicates the record-breaking tourist travel which may be expected this summer.

A total of those traveling in private cars was 2,392, by the transportation company 369, and walking, driving, etc., 139.

The work on the new trail down to the water's edge from the hotel on the rim is now under way, and when completed will make it possible for all visitors, young and old, to get to the water. It is to be six feet wide, and will take a much easier grade than the one formerly used.

CHINA WILL NOW JOIN WORLD WAR

PRESIDENT APPROVES DECISION OF CABINET—BELIEVED THAT DECLARATION WILL BE MADE THIS WEEK

PEKING, Aug. 2.—(Delayed)—Acting President Feng Kwo Chang has approved the unanimous decision reached at the special cabinet meeting to declare war on Germany and Austria.

It is expected that the declaration will be issued next week. Prominent Germans are arranging to go to Java. Spain is expected to handle Austria's interests.

DRAFTED MEN MUST APPEAR FOR INSPECTION

ELKS HALL TO BE HEADQUARTERS FOR WORK

Forty Men Are to Be Selected for the First Call From the Government. Decisions of Local Board not Final. Men Must Be Examined Before They Can Apply for Exemption. Exemptions Fled by August 11th.

The examinations for the drafted men will be held this week, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the Elks hall by the local exemption board.

Notices have been sent to each man apprising him of the date he is to appear. Eighty will be examined first, and more if it is necessary to meet the required quota of this district.

Drafted men have until August 11 to file exemptions, but all must take to file exemptions, but all must take those who are not accepted will not have to file exemptions.

The local board will only examine on the physical, alien and dependency sections. The questions of occupation etc., are to be decided by the district board.

BOTTLES BREAK LAURO ARRESTED

SHOEMAKER IS TAKEN INTO CUSTODY ON RECEIPT OF TRUNK WHICH LEAKS WINE—HEARING TOMORROW

A trunk filled with many bottles of red wine caused the arrest late Saturday of W. K. Lauro, a shoemaker located on Main street, near the Central school.

The trunk was recently shipped from California, and on its arrival was found to be leaking liquid of a very suspicious nature. The authorities here were notified of its condition, and were on the lookout for the owner.

The checks for ownership were held by Lauro, who sent the express wagon to the depot for it.

Federal officials accompanied the expressman when it was delivered, and arrested Lauro, who claimed that it was not his trunk, but that the checks for it were left by a man he did not know.

The name on the trunk was Capsea. Lauro claims that he attends to the business of many of his customers, and is not acquainted with the man who left the check. His hearing will come tomorrow morning before United States commissioner Bert C. Thomas. Assistant United States Attorney J. H. Carnahan will appear for the government. The charge is a violation of the interstate commerce clause of the federal liquor law.
