

ANCHORED SHIP IS NOW HOTEL

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 7.—Vacations may be enjoyed in Holland on board a liner without the present day perils. This privilege is conferred by the use of the floating hotel of the 12,000 ton steamship Jan Pieterzoon Coen, one of the Netherlands Steamship company's colonial liners. In normal times this ship runs between here and the Dutch East Indies, but since the unrestricted submarine war, her owners have laid her up for safety in Amsterdam harbor.

The steamer was anchored at an attractive spot on the North Sea canal, between Velsen and Ymuiden, and opened as a hotel. Remunerative patronage was easily secured at prices according with those of first class hotels at Holland's seaside resorts, and there was a big run on this innovation in European holiday facilities.

ELIHU ROOT IS BACK FROM EAST

IS IMPRESSED WITH TASK NOW BEFORE AMERICA—PETTY DIFFERENCES MUST BE THROWN ASIDE, HE SAYS

A PACIFIC PORT, Aug. 6.—"Liberty founded upon sacrifice and hardship can be preserved only by sacrifice and suffering. Eternal struggle is the price of liberty," declared Elihu Root, head of the diplomatic mission to Russia at a luncheon tendered the former secretary of state and his associates here on their return to the United States.

"The first and greatest test is not between the troops of Germany and those of our country, but between the great and noble qualities of the American nature and those degenerating tendencies that come with luxury and tend to kill men's capacity for sacrifice."

Mr. Root and the other members of the mission were guests of the city at the luncheon in a great hall, where more than 2,000 persons were served and as many more listened to the addresses of the guests.

The addresses of Mr. Root and the others who spoke, dwelt vigorously and feelingly on the tremendous scope of the task which the United States faces and the need for casting aside petty differences of opinion for united action against America's foe. They were unanimous in declaring that Russia, now in bitter travail, would arise strong and free.

The mission was entertained by an automobile trip about the city. The members left on their journey eastward.

They've viewed the mammoth garden crop and vowed that they will put a stop to all the waste of food that taken place from year to year and made the winter living dear for every household brood. No more we'll see tomatoes lie decaying on the fruitful vine, nor apples on the trees, no more we'll see things lie and rot within a fertile garden spot while mother's out at tea. For every woman in the town has dressed herself in kitchen gown and works with all her might to can and dry the things she'll need her hungry family to feed, with winter days in sight. The girls have taken mother's cue and dad and all the brothers, too, have set themselves to work because they know the war time thrift must be the patriotic gift which none of us may shirk.
