

## German Minister Has Trouble in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 7.—A clash between Heinrich von Eckhardt, the German minister to Mexico, and Mexican newspaper photographers, in which it is declared that the German diplomat came to blows with the newspaper men, enlivened the recent session of the Mexican National Commercial Congress held here. Herr von Eckhardt is the man who was directed by Dr. Alfred Zimmerman, then German foreign minister, to make arrangements to bring Mexico with Japan into war with the United States. He, with other members of the diplomatic corps and President Carranza attended the opening session of the congress.

Newspaper photographers sent to snap the president set up their cameras in the aisle close to the German minister, who was seated at one end

of the row of seats to keep him as far as possible from the representatives of the entente allies, who occupied the same row. Von Eckhardt protested, in what the photographers described as a rough and caustic manner, that he did not intend to be annoyed by photographers, but the camera men paid little attention to him, and photographed President Carranza and the diplomatic corps from the most available spot, which was directly behind von Eckhardt.

When the flashlight exploded, say the photographers, von Eckhardt remonstrated not only with words, but with blows.

El Excelsior, in commenting on the incident the next morning, declared that a diplomat of von Eckhardt's experience should have learned before this how to conduct himself toward the press.

## Government of Norway to Lose Employees

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Aug. 7.—As far as the food problem is concerned, Norway has been in a better condition than the other two Scandinavian countries, and, although the public more than a year ago asked that it be put on rations of sugar, flour and potatoes, the government has not yet found it necessary. At present everybody can obtain all he needs of foodstuffs. If he is able to pay the high prices. The government and the municipalities are trying to help by paying a certain part of the excess prices, so that the laborer, for instance, has been able to buy milk, bread, fuel, pork, and some other articles of food at prices not much higher than under normal circumstances. As his wages have been raised from 40 to 100 per cent in the last three years, the high cost of living is felt less by the laborer than by people working on a fixed salary in the service of the state or cities. These public employers have not made the salaries follow the increased cost of living. The result is that it has come to a crisis for the civil service; young, well fitted men resign their positions for better places with private employers, and the work in the governmental departments is crippled.

All railroad employees, from station agents to the laborers, have resigned their places, and will walk out September 1st, declaring their wages are too low for a decent living. If the government does not yield to the demand for better salaries—a request unanimously supported by almost the whole press of the country, the railroad service over the whole country will be stopped September 1st.

As Norway, except in some branches, is unable to produce food enough for the use of her own people, an embargo has been placed on most kinds of food. Hardly a pound of butter is exported now; no potatoes, nor flour. Imported articles, like sugar and coffee, under an agreement with the seller, are not exported. Smuggling of the exportation of embargoed goods, has been punished to the full extent of the law. It is claimed here that very little, if any, of the groceries or provisions brought from England, France or the United States is reaching Germany thru Norway.

In view of the fact that the United States has joined the belligerents, a governmental committee has been collecting information as to Norway's need for food, and how to regulate the consumption of it. The committee found the country has a supply sufficient for three months, even if all importation is stopped, without placing the people on rations.

Public opinion seems to be prepared for a voluntary or forced embargo on all trade or commercial relations with Germany. Germany itself has prepared the way for such a course by its treatment of Norway. Therefore, the messages from Washington regarding the American control of exports to neutral countries have created no anxiety here.

The national pride and self-respect are hurt and humiliated because Norway continues to show a friendly face to and to trade with Germany, which has treated Norway, in many ways, as a hostile country. As a whole, the Norwegian people, having lost all sympathy with Germany, and needing all the foodstuffs and provisions for their own use, gladly will submit to a strict embargo on all articles of food, and on any other supplies, provided it would help to shorten the war.

## TREMENDOUS BELT FOR WEED CO.

TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS WORTH OF CATTLE WILL BE KILLED

TO GET HIDES FOR LARGEST BELT ON THE COAST

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—Six hundred and fifty full grown steers must die to enable the Davis-Scott Belting company to make one belt for the Weed Lumber company. That number of hides will be required. It will be the largest leather belt on the Pacific coast. It will be 72 inches wide and 226 feet long. Its approximate cost will be \$8,000.

Only the center of the hides can be used, and by the process of belt making when completed it will appear as one solid strip of leather, not a seam or union being visible.

The foregoing are the statements of C. R. Davis, president of the Davis-Scott Belting company. The Weed mill, Mr. Davis says, has the largest equipment on the coast, and the Portland belt factory's excellent product is recognized by awarding to it this big contract, for which there were bidders from both East and West.

## Heavy Transportation By the British Navy

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The British merchant marine has carried successfully to their destinations 8,000,000 men and 10,000,000 tons of war material, said Commander Dion Calthorpe recently, describing the work done by the navy.

In six months of last year only one in a thousand ships passing thru Dover patrol has been sunk or damaged.

Up to January of this year not a life had been lost in the transport of

men from this country to France.

In the course of the war 1,000,000 sick and wounded men had been transported to this country, more than 1,000,000 horses and mules, 50,000,000 gallons of petrol; 100,000,000 hundredweight of wheat and 7,000,000 tons of iron ore.

Referring to submarines he said there were a great many German widows and orphans who doubted the success of the U boat. They were many women in Germany whose husbands did not come back.

## MOVIE PLANT FOR UNCLE SAM'S BOYS

PARIS, Aug. 7.—The signal corps of the United States army has perfected plans for the establishment in France of a huge plant for developing and printing motion and still pictures. From the plant, which is expected eventually to become one of the largest of its kind in the world, will be issued the photographs which are to form historical records of America's participation in the war.

Within a week it will begin giving out photographs for use in American newspapers. The photographs will be censored in France.

## U. S. Breaks All Records in Foreign Trade

Imports of merchandise into as well as exports from the United States during the fiscal year 1917 greatly exceeded the figures of former years, according to a statement just issued by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce of the department of commerce. In round numbers imports amounted to 2,659 million, and exports to 2,294 million dollars for merchandise only, thus showing an excess of exports or favorable balance of trade of 3,635 million dollars, with a total foreign trade of 8,953 million dollars.

Imports in 1917 show an increase of 461 million dollars over 1916, 985 million over 1915, and 765 million dollars over 1914—the last normal year before the war. Exports in 1917 were larger by 1,961 million dollars than in 1916, 3,525 million more than in 1915, and 3,329 million dollars over the 1914 figures.

The gain in the balance of trade in 1917 over previous years amounted to 1,499 million dollars over 1916, 2,540 million over 1915, and 3,164 million dollars over 1914, with increases in the total foreign trade of 2,422 million dollars over 1916, 4,511 million over 1915, and 4,695 million dollars over 1914.

For the single month of June 1917,

the total imports were 307 million dollars, of which 218 million dollars, or 71 per cent, were entered free of duty. The total during this month exceeds by 36 million dollars the imports of the previous month of May, which up to that time were the highest in any one month.

Exports of merchandise during June amounted to 576 million dollars, the highest in any month with the exception of January, 1917, which shows exports valued at 613 million dollars.

### FREE WILL BAPTIST (MEETING IN THIS CITY)

S. E. Bettis, cowboy preacher is coming to Klamath Falls to hold meetings for a month. He is a free will Baptist, general superintendent of the Free Will Baptists of Twelve western states. Rev. Bettis has traveled over 2100 miles with his horse and buggy holding meetings since last November. He was scheduled to preach in Fort Klamath Sunday. The date of his arrival here has not been announced.

## Guests Are Expected to Behave Here

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—In an allegorical talk in which he likened them to visitors or guests in a house, Judge Roseman sentenced M. Knutson, G. Gunderson and John Wolah, three I. W. W., to twenty days in jail.

The three men were arrested Friday for distributing handbills without the proper license. The handbills were attacks on United States Attorney Clarence L. Roames and denouncing three of the local newspapers for their alleged partiality against the I. W. W. cause.

Because none of the men is a naturalized citizen, Judge Roseman said: "You are like the tenants in a house. You are merely a guest, and while you are here you must behave yourself. You are not citizens of the United States, and as her guests you must conduct yourselves as such."

"While the crime you are charged with is not such a serious one in normal times, it becomes greatly magnified under present conditions by fomenting internal strife when we should all be united against a common enemy."
