FRED B. DUNBAR GETS COMMISSION

WILL RECEIVE RANK OF SERGEANT IN QUARTERMASTERS CORPS. WILL BE AMONG FIRST TO GO TO FRANCE.

The many local friends of Fred B. Dunbar will be pleased to learn of his appointment as sergeant in the Quartermasters Corps in the United States Army. He has been working in the office of Adjutant General White and expects that the corps will go immediately to Palo Alto and then on to France.

Mr. Dunbar recently resigned his position as city editor of the Herald to enter the service. His advancement comes in recognition of his strenuous work in the office of the Adjutant General.

His letter to his parents Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Dunbar, follows in part. "We got orders today to prepare to go to Palo Alto immediately and expect to get away within two or three days.

"Tomorrow, Sunday, we go into Federal service.

I am due to receive an appointment as Sergeant today, but as I have not yet seen it, am biding my time. It will mean a raise in pay as well as rank.

I am in the Quartermaster's corps of the Oregon National Guard but after tomorrow will be in the Q. M. C. of the regular army. This corps is the business end of the army and we go to Palo Alto to prepare for the coming of the national guards, which are to be trained there before going to France, from seven or eight western states. Our corps goes intact which helps some as we were afraid we might be scattered out separately.

We have been working night and day getting the headquarters here into shape for the call. I have been engaged most of the time in Adjutant General White's office working on the draft business and am just winding it up today.

Saw Haines and Oram on their way to Ft. Stevens the other day. There are several Oregon fellows in my corps and lots of them in the coast artillery, engineers and other departments which are all expected to go to Palo Alto this summer or fall to train for the winter.

"Everybody is tickled as it looks as if we will be the first of the Oregon contingent to see Palo Alto—the first step towards France.

FIGHTING THE PLAGUE

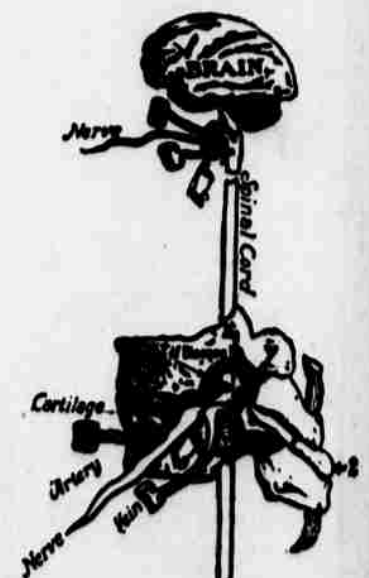
