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HAWAII'S EX-QUEEN IS LOYAL TO U. S.

Flies "Old Glory" Over Her Home in Sandwich Island and Otherwise Manifests Friendship

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Aug. 8.—Ex-queen Liliuokalani of the Hawaiian Islands, has shown great loyalty to the Stars and Stripes since President Wilson signed the Declaration of War against Germany. The ex-queen has always been loyal to the United States. Since 1893 she has resided in Washington Place, which was the home of her husband, the prince consort, who died at the beginning of her reign in 1891. Immediately after the declaration of war, the queen called her chamberlain, Co. Curtis P. Yauke, now Secretary of the Territory under appointment by President Wilson, and requested that an American flag be raised over her home instead of the customary Hawaiian flag. This was the first time an American flag had ever floated above Washington Place. The home was named in honor of George Washington when it was erected in 1848. The name Washington Place was officially recorded by the King of Hawaii of that period, Kamehameha III. The building was designed and erected by a Captain Isaac S. Hartby, trade an architect and builder—for Captain J. Dominis during the forties. It took several years for construction

during which time Captain Dominis voyaged back and forth to China bringing with him sundry material toward its construction. His last trip in 1847, when he was lost, was to have brought his furnishings. The name Washington Place was given to it by the American commissioner at that time, Mr. Ten Eyck and confirmed by the King.

He was recently promoted to the rank of captain according to a letter recently received by his father. Captain Morrow spent some time in the medical work in Belgium in the earlier part of the war. In recognition of his efforts, he was knighted by King Albert of Belgium. He is now a captain in the United States army medical corps. Dr. Morrow is well known in this city, where he practiced for some time as a partner of Dr. R. R. Hamilton.

Drought Threatens Hawaii's Sugar Crop

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Aug. 8.—Lack of rainfall is causing grave apprehension among the sugar men of Hawaii, who fear that unless weather conditions materially change in the near future, the 1918 crop of sugar will fall far below normal. For months there has been very little rain in the cane districts, particularly on the Island of Hawaii, and the cane is showing the effect. The 1917 crop is so far advanced that it will not be injured, and the 1918 crop is fairly safe. But the newly planted 1919 crop is said to be suffering severely. On all of the islands the precipitation has been extremely light since the winter rains stopped, and they were much less in volume than the normal, the result being that the reservoirs are being rapidly emptied. Even in Honolulu warning has been issued by the superintendent of water works that householders must go slow on the precious fluid or face a water famine before long.

Many Books Are Sent for Soldiers

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Over 1,000 books have been received at the Portland library from residents in various parts of Oregon for the use of men enlisted in the United States army and navy. The Portland library has become a clearing house for the state for gathering the books and will forward them to the mobilization camps soon.

In each book sent out is a plate saying it was given by citizens of Oregon, with a reminder to handle it carefully and give the next man a chance to read it.

Course in "War Bread" at Summer School

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 8.—Lessons Winifred Kerr in a course on food in making "war bread" from potatoes, peanuts, beans, bran, rice and demonstrations of war time food savings were given at the University and allowed to try out their recipes at Oregon summer school by Miss Kerr on the school.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 8.—According to Berlin advises the final result of the State income tax assessment for Berlin in the taxation year of 1917 shows a total of 48,000,000 marks, or an increase of 3,500,000 over the 1916 assessment. Taxpayers with incomes of over 3,000 marks number 64,630 or 9,344 more than in 1916. The average income of skilled munition workers at the present time is from 5,000 to 6,000 and, in many cases, 7,000 marks.
