SENATE PASSES FOOD BILL
AS DESIRED BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 8.—The Senate has passed the food bill in the form the President desires, by a vote of sixty-six to seven. Negative votes were cast by Democrats, Hollis, Reed and Republican by France, Gronna, LaFollette and Pearson.

The bill has already passed the house, and now goes to the President for his signature. It provides for a one man administration.

DAN SULLIVAN IS TO REMAIN HERE

WILL STAY IN KLAMATH COUNTY TO SERVE OUT SENTENCE OF VAGRANCY. ONE OF ALLEGED I. W. W. CONVICTED RECENTLY

An order has been received by Assistant U. S. Attorney J. H. Carnahan from the Federal authorities at Portland to hold Dan Sullivan, the I. W. W. agitator, convicted here last week on a charge of vagrancy and let him serve out his sentence until further instruction. Sullivan is also accused on a federal charge of violation of the espionage act and it is understood that his case will come up before the next meeting of the federal grand jury.

NEW CHANCELLOR IS NOT POPULAR

SOCIALIST MEMBER OF REICHSTAG DEMANDS THAT CHANGE BE MADE ALLOWING MORE REPRESENTATION OF PEOPLE

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 8.—Phillip Scheidman, Socialist member of the Reichstag in speaking at Mannesbach before six thousand people demanded in the interests of peace, the substitution for the present government of Chancellor Michaelis, a government really representing the German people's will.

A Catholic organ says that "persons so foolish as to expect great gain in the direction of parliamentary regime as a result of the new government will naturally be disappointed."

INHUMAN CRUELTY USED ON VICTIMS

GERMANS PRACTICE UNBELIEVABLE CRUELTY ON PRISONERS CAPTURED BY SUBMARINES. THIRTY-EIGHT DROWNED

LONDON, Aug. 8.—Four Americans among a crew of thirty-eight were drowned when the British Steamer "Belgian Prince" was submerged on July 31st. One American is among the three survivors, who say that the submarine shelled the vessel and ordered the crew to assemble on the submarine's deck where their life belts and clothing were removed.

The submarine then traveled four miles along the surface before diving, leaving the men to their fate.

Dependent Wives Will Not Exempt

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—An unexpected number of exemption claims have been filed here on the ground of dependent wives. Four claims for exemptions on this ground were rejected in one district yesterday.

Seward Prosser, president of the Bankers' Trust Company of New York City, and chairman of the Red Cross War Finance Committee, has sent forth a call to the shareholders of corporations to pay up the Red Cross dividends declared when the campaign to raise \$100,000,000 was on. The work that Mr. Prosser did in getting this sum of money for a charitable object was considered by financiers one of the most remarkable tasks ever accomplished by one of them. Never before had a sum so large been raised in such a short time for a purpose of this kind.

NEW STAGE OF WAR TO BEGIN

RUSSIAN GENERAL DECLARES THAT RUSS FORCES WILL NOT SURRENDER. SAYS ALLIES MUST TRAIN HUGE ARMIES

LONDON, Aug. 8.—"The first stage of the war is over. The second stage begins today," General Korniloff told a correspondent of the London Times, just before leaving to take supreme command of the Russian Armies. The commander repudiated the possibility of the Russians surrendering. He asserts that if Russia concludes the dishonorable peace which traitors have been driving her, she will become a German colony forever. He declared that the Germans would seize her foodstuffs and enroll Russian men.

"Russia is full of fighting men" he declared "and the Allies must help train them."

BOARDS ARE ASKED TO SPEED UP

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 8.—Adjutant General White announced today that the first one-third of Oregon's draft quota of seven hundred and seventeen would be called to the colors by September 1st and would be enroute to the training camps by September 5th. He urged the Exemption Boards to speed up their work.

Accused Governor Refuses Statement

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 8.—M. M. Crane, counsel for the Texas house of representatives which, sitting as a committee of the whole, is investigating the impeachment charges brought against Governor James E. Ferguson by Speaker F. O. Fuller, sprung a surprise at the opening of the hearing today when he called for the governor to take the stand. This the governor refused to do, claiming his constitutional right to first hear the evidence against him.

R. HALE FAINTS AT \$50.00 FINE

IS SENTENCED FOR BEATING HIS WIFE AND TOPPLES OVER ON HEARING VERDICT. IS NOW IN THE COUNTY JAIL

Consternation prevailed in the Justice Court of E. W. Gowan last night when Ralph Hale, fined thirty dollars and costs for beating his wife passed temporarily into oblivion, on hearing sentence pronounced. The officers allege however that the faint into which Hale fell should have been spelled faint and that his condition was at no time serious. Hale was found guilty of beating his wife Sunday night and of dragging her down the street on Monday. Mrs. Hale has been working at a boarding house near the Pelican Bay Lumber Company. Hale was unable to pay his fine and has been placed in the county jail.

STRIKE IS SOON TO BE SETTLED

MILL WORKERS OF WASHINGTON HAVE DEFINITE PROPOSITION TO MAKE EMPLOYERS AT THE MEETING TO BE HELD TODAY

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—Representatives of the striking mill owners and the employers of Western Washington are confident that progress will be made today toward settlement of their differences.

President Borwon of the Spindle Weavers Union declared today that workers have a definite proposition to advance, when representatives of both sides meet with the Council of Defense.

Peculiar Case of Housemaid's Knee

BEND, Or., Aug. 8.—To become eligible for the officers' reserve training camp in case he should receive an appointment, B. A. Stover of Bend underwent an operation for the removal of a large growth caused by the friction of his elbow on the desk while writing. The growth was characterized by the examining officer as "housemaid's knee of the elbow" and is declared rare.

WIFE IS NOT KICKING

YERINGTON, Nev., Aug. 8.—Clarence Wise was shoeing a horse when a collar that hung on the wall fell on the horse, frightening him. The animal jumped, throwing Wise against a mule, which promptly kicked him back onto the horse. The horse, a second time, kicked him against the anvil, cutting a bad gash in his head. Wise says the unfortunate part is that he intended going to San Francisco to enlist. Now he will have to stay home and be drafted.
